FR. PAUL'S WEEKLY LETTER

Dear Friend of Carmel Mission,

Today in the Gospel we hear the Magnificat, Mary's powerful prayer of joy and praise to God. "My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord; my spirit rejoices in God my Savior." (Luke 1:46) Mary's courage in saying yes to God is nothing less than incredible, but what strikes me most is her preternatural calm in a moment that would cause anyone else to at least balk, if not panic. An angel of God has appeared to her, not a daily occurrence. The angel announces that she, an unwed teenager, is going to bear the Son of God. Imagine what must have been going through her mind. What does it even mean that God is going to come into the world in human form, as her child no less? We have been wrestling with that last question for over 2000 years and it still boggles the mind!

Mary's immediate response is trust and acceptance of God's plan. In the Gospel today, she has had a chance to digest a bit more of what the angel has imparted. She traveled to Elizabeth and received a welcome she could hardly have expected. Elizabeth not only believes her, she knows she is in the presence of God. Mary is then free to express her inner joy. Her spirit is rejoicing in God, certain of God's promise of mercy.

God wants this same freedom for all of us. God wants our joy to overwhelm all our doubt and our fear. God wants us to trust as Mary does, certain that all things are possible through God. Her conviction is not a mere feeling, it is based on an intimate relationship with God. In the Magnificat she makes the case for why each of us should rejoice in our God, turning away our fears with the surety of God's promise and God's fidelity to us. This week I invite you to join me in meditating on her powerful words, and letting our spirits rejoice in God our Savior.

My brothers and sisters in Christ:

In my video message of February of 2021, I shared with you that the Holy See has made it clear that receiving the COVID-19 vaccine is morally acceptable. Likewise, the Holy See affirmed that all vaccines now available are morally permissible and can be used in good conscience. Pope Francis has highly encouraged the vaccination as an act of safeguarding one's own health as well as that of others – pointing us to the importance of the *common good*, such a key element of Catholic Social Teaching. Indeed, both Pope Francis and Pope Emeritus Benedict have received the vaccine as examples for us. The Bishops of California have also encouraged vaccination for the same reasons listed above.

For these reasons, I will not issue, and I have directed our clergy not to issue, any Letters of Religious exemption because it would contradict the clear objective teaching of the Catholic Church and the Holy See on this matter.

I want to take this opportunity to once more, encourage those who have not done so, and have no medical impediments to avoid it, to get vaccinated. Let us continue to pray that the Lord accompany us during these times of additional risk, help us to make the most responsible decisions in our conscience, and to pray as well, for greater unity in our Church and in society.

Scripture Message

Today we celebrate the Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. While not recounted in scripture, this feast has been part of the church's tradition since the early centuries. It developed out of reflection among the faithful on the profound role Mary had in the history of salvation. It was understood that her role in the divine plan warranted her being taken bodily to heaven, to be in God's home. In the Gospel of Luke today we hear the story of Mary's visit to her cousin Elizabeth. We can surmise from the fact that Mary had just learned that she was pregnant that she was not showing any obvious sign, but through the power of the Holy Spirit and the reaction of her unborn child, John the Baptist, Elizabeth immediately recognized that she was in the presence of her Lord. Mary is the model of perfect discipleship. She trusts in God's plan, listens to God's voice, and is ready and willing to take action to do her part in God's work on earth. She is the embodiment of who we hope to be as disciples. She literally carried Christ in her body as a living tabernacle. In the Eucharist we consume the Body and Blood of Jesus and we are similarly called to be living, mobile tabernacles, bearing Christ to the world. How does Mary's example of faithfulness to God inspire your discipleship?

FORECOURT RENOVATION

The restoration and seismic retrofit of the Sir Harry Downie Museum and the Basilica Forecourt started on April 5 and is off to a great start. The construction is expected to continue through the fall when we look forward to celebrating the 250th anniversary of the founding of the Mission. Access to the property from the Basilica entrance gates through to the Crespi lot will be off limits until the completion of construction.



The project calls for a completely new courtyard surface and walkways, which will be regraded and expanded to allow for improved ADA accessibility. The Downie building's interior will be renovated to allow more exhibition space along with the creation of 2 ADA compliant restrooms. The fountain will be restored as the centerpiece of refreshed garden beds.



We are grateful to the Carmel Mission Foundation and their ongoing commitment to raise the funds to restore and preserve our beautiful Carmel Mission property.

Dear Friend of Carmel Mission,

I hope and pray that you and your loved ones are safe and well, as we embark on our faith journey through this special year of 2021, during which we celebrate the 250th Anniversary of the founding of our beautiful Mission by Saint Junípero Serra.

This is a year of RECOVERY and RENEWAL, a time to celebrate our past achievements and to plan for our future. While it is obviously true that conditions and restrictions of 2020 impacted our parish, both materially and spiritually, we have not been idle. We have used the time wisely to explore new and innovative ways to keep our community together and to plan for our future.

Who could have predicted how important the timing of our 2020 AMA Heavenly Sounds Campaign would be? The console of our beautiful Casavant organ has been restored and updated by its original makers and is awaiting re-installation. We have invested in a superb outdoor sound system for our masses in our Central Courtyard. We have been broadcasting mass on our website and our YouTube channel, which has enabled us to gather as a virtual community, and which is of particular benefit to those parishioners who are unable to attend mass in person.

It is time to launch our 2021 AMA (Annual Ministry Appeal). Our diocese has chosen the theme "Building a Family of Faith". I enclose an AMA information leaflet which indicates the range of ministries that you support by participating in the campaign. The first \$52,000 raised goes back to the diocese, and any sum we raise over that sum, comes back to our parish for RECOVERY and RENEWAL during our 250th Anniversary year. At Carmel Mission, we have set a total goal of \$250,000. We will use the additional \$198,000 to increase our efforts at building up our virtual family of faith. We plan to enhance our filming and digital communication capabilities through the investment in state of the art equipment and upgrades to our wireless infrastructure.

With the addition of our new Central Courtyard Restrooms, currently under construction, and the renovation of the Downie Museum and Basilica Forecourt, planned for this Spring, we will also invest in improving safety and access to our beautiful Mission. We will also expand our Museum exhibition space, in order to attract and welcome more visitors and pilgrims, whose support we greatly appreciate and rely on. We will share our progress towards achieving our goals on a dedicated page on our website and our weekly bulletin. In each of the past three years, your generosity has enabled us to achieve our AMA goals: Upgrade of Crespi Parish Hall, Renew Our Pews, and Heavenly Sounds. We could not have done this without you. I thank you from the bottom of my heart.

During this 250th Anniversary year, I know that I can count on your selfless stewardship and your generous support of our beautiful Carmel Mission.







DOCENT CORNER:

Mission Factoid — Part 1

To help build the first Carmel Mission there were 40 neophyte Indians from the Baja Missions, 3 soldiers and 5 sailors with Fr. Junipero Serra serving as the construction supervisor.

The first livestock arrived at the new Mission location while the buildings were being erected. A boar and a sow with four pigs were herded over from Monterey while nine cows with calf, two yearling heifers and six heifer calves were driven up from San Diego.

On May 9, 1774, the supply ship San Antonio landed in Monterey with the first white women to arrive in California, listed as four matrons and three maidens.

In addition to making plans for the restoration, legendary curator Harry Downie guided tourists through the church. For the sake of atmosphere, the guide often wore a cassock and he found that some of the visitors would address him as Brother Harry or Father Downie. He didn't bother to correct them as long as the vestment encouraged the tourists to make donations for the further restoration.

Reverend Ramon Mestres, pastor of San Carlos Church in Monterey and responsible for the Carmel Mission performed the marriage of local school teacher Lou Henry to a young engineer named Herbert Hoover on February 10, 1899. This took place at an outdoor ceremony in the Royal Presidio Chapel Garden (both were Quakers but in the absence of a Quaker meeting house, Mestres was asked to officiate as civil magistrate.) Herbert Hoover was thus the first U.S. president to be married by a Catholic priest.

The Crucifixion scene in the south hallway off the nave is by Manuel de Chile, a well-known artist of Quito, Ecuador. It was gifted or purchased by Herbert Hoover when he visited Quito in 1928. It was purchased by Harry Downie from Stanford University which had acquired it from President Hoover. The pieces are of carved wood - painted, gilded, estofadoe'd, and dressed in lace and gold embroidered velvet with intricate silver and gold head ornaments.

Mortar for sandstone slabs used in the construction of the walls was made from abalone shells.

For a short time during the 1850's, part of the abandoned church and quadrangle were used by Dominican Fathers as a house of studies. They then left for Benicia.



CARMEL MISSION COMMUNITY

In 1929, Father Michael Murphy became the first priest to live at the Carmel Mission since Father Jose Maria del Real left in 1845. Fr. Murphy probably lived in the building built as a residence for visiting priests (it is now the Downie Museum). Fr. Murphy is buried in the Mission cemetery. The brass plate on the headstone reads "Rev. Michael C. Murphy, 1870-1949, Blessed are they who die in the Lord". It is located on the Indian side of the cemetery not far to the left from the headstone of Msgr. Mestres. The headstone faces into the cemetery and is only visible from the inside.

The Latin word "basilica" was originally used to describe a Roman public building, usually located at the centre of a Roman town (forum). In Hellenistic cities, public basilicas appeared in the 2nd century BC. After the Roman Empire became officially Christian, the term came by extension to refer to a large and important church that has been given special ceremonial rights by the Pope.

Four California Missions are minor basilicas: Carmel Mission was designated a basilica in 1961, San Juan Capistrano Church (not the original mission) in 2000, San Francisco Asis which is the church next to Mission Dolores in 1952, and Mission San Diego in 1975.

In 1882, Father Casanova, pastor of San Carlos Church had the graves of Fr. Serra and Fr. Crespi opened to disprove rumors that their bones had been stolen and distributed as relics.
