FR. PAUL'S WEEKLY LETTER

Dear Friend of Carmel Mission,

There is a saying, "you can never be a prophet in your own land." Jesus says much the same in the Gospel today after his very disappointing homecoming. We can well imagine that He likely looked forward to returning home, to being with those who knew Him best, and had watched Him grow up. He is amazed at their lack of faith, and likely saddened that He was unable to share with them His true nature.

Why did Jesus' community turn on Him? He could have been welcomed home as a hometown hero, the local boy who made good. No doubt news of His miracles and teaching had reached them. Jesus had been healing the sick, raising the dead, casting out demons and commanding the wind and sea all around the Galilee. When the people first hear Him teaching in the synagogue, they are astonished at His wisdom. But this quickly turns to offense and outrage due to an all too common human failing. They failed to see the extraordinary in the ordinary.

To them Jesus was just a carpenter's son, an ordinary guy. Certainly He could not also be the Messiah, the Son of God, the giver of life and health. Surely such a person would be extraordinary in ways large and small, nothing like themselves at all. That it would be a local craftsman, a man whose family they know well, who has shared the banalities of day to day life with them does not seem possible, and so they are offended by and reject Jesus. In this way they are thinking like people do, not as God does. God continually puts the extraordinary into the ordinary. We need only contemplate the natural world to be amazed by God's creative genius.

In our world today, we continue to be drawn to the outwardly extraordinary, to the powerful, the wealthy, and the famous. I invite you this week to join me in looking closer to home as we seek wisdom and a better understanding of God's truth. We may be surprised by the extraordinary nature of those we might otherwise overlook. Our own St. Junipero is one such example.

CARMEL MISSION REOPENING ADVISORY

Dear Friend of Carmel Mission,


Like you, we have eagerly anticipated the lessening of COVID-19 restrictions in our state of California. We are following the new guidelines from the State, County and our Diocese of Monterey. Please be aware that each parish has discretion to, within the given parameters, conduct services as best serves their community and their unique conditions.

1. The dispensation from the Sunday Obligation will remain in place at this time.
2. For fully vaccinated individuals a face mask is not required. For unvaccinated individuals, a face mask is required indoors.
3. Social distancing, either indoors or outdoors, is no longer required.
4. We will continue to offer the 11am Mass outdoors in the Central Courtyard, and to offer outdoor seating at our 9am Mass in the Basilica. This provides options to everyone in our community who wishes to attend Mass, either inside the Basilica or outside in the Courtyard. It is our intention to add a 5:30pm Saturday Vigil Mass inside the Basilica beginning in mid-July.
5. Entrance for Sunday Masses remains as it has been, through the parish office, formerly school, lot. Temperatures will no longer be taken at the entrance.
6. We intend to resume Daily Mass in the Blessed Sacrament Chapel on an initially limited basis in mid-July.
7. Congregational singing is now allowed, but those who are unvaccinated must wear a mask or refrain from singing, both indoors and outdoors. We will not be able to offer hymn books at this time, but a limited number of Breaking Bread hymnals do remain available to purchase if you wish. We are happy to announce the return of our Carmel Mission Choir to the 11am Mass.
8. The Distribution of the Chalice: The Precious Blood will continue to be suspended at this time until further notice.
9. We are looking forward to planning how our ministry activities will resume as we go forward. We have a unique opportunity to build on the solid foundation that has been formed as we have negotiated the many challenges and changes brought about by the pandemic. We will be collaborating with ministry leaders to determine activities, and review and publish policies and procedures on our website.
10. Due to the ongoing construction work, Crepsi Hall remains closed at this time.

The situation with the pandemic continues to be dynamic, and of great concern in this country and worldwide. We are happy that the safe lessening of restrictions will allow us to return to more of our usual activities, but we are also conscious of the ongoing need to protect the health and safety of our parishioners, our visitors and our staff. This remains our guiding principle as it has been throughout this crisis. Our website remains the best means of staying abreast of conditions at the Mission.

We thank you for your continued support and all you do to make Carmel Mission a very special and sacred place,

Scripture Message

It is not easy being a prophet. In the first reading, Ezekiel is certainly confronted with this. God warns him that the people God is sending Ezekiel to are hard headed and obstinate, and likely will not listen to him or heed his warnings. In the second reading, St. Paul is confronted with a "thorn in his flesh." (members of the community who are co-opting God's message for their own self-aggrandizement). And in the Gospel, Jesus returns home to his native place, only to be rejected by his own hometown, unable to share His true nature with those he grew up with because of their lack of faith. In all these cases it may have felt easier to just give up, to not even try. But God tells Ezekiel that however futile it feels, it is important that he go so that the people will know, even if they do not heed him, a prophet of God is in their midst. St. Paul begs God to remove the thorns and is told no, instead God will create power from his weaknesses. And Jesus, saddened no doubt at his dismal homecoming, still heals those that he can before moving on. In our baptism, we are each made priest, prophet and king. We may not always succeed, we may even fail, to be heard as a prophet. The examples from the Scriptures today is that the attempt alone is worth the effort. How have you felt called to live out your identity as a prophet of God? When has a perceived failure actually become a success with God's help?

FORECOURT RENOVATION

The restoration and seismic retrofit of the Sir Harry Downie Museum and the Basilica Forecourt started on April 5 and is off to a great start. The construction is expected to continue through the fall when we look forward to celebrating the 250th anniversary of the founding of the Mission. Access to the property from the Basilica entrance gates through to the Crespi lot will be off limits until the completion of construction.

The project calls for a completely new courtyard surface and walkways, which will be regraded and expanded to allow for improved ADA accessibility. The Downie building's interior will be renovated to allow more exhibition space along with the creation of 2 ADA compliant restrooms. The fountain will be restored as the centerpiece of refreshed garden beds.

We are grateful to the Carmel Mission Foundation and their ongoing commitment to raise the funds to restore and preserve our beautiful Carmel Mission property.

Dear Friend of Carmel Mission,

I hope and pray that you and your loved ones are safe and well, as we embark on our faith journey through this special year of 2021, during which we celebrate the 250th Anniversary of the founding of our beautiful Mission by Saint Junípero Serra.

This is a year of RECOVERY and RENEWAL, a time to celebrate our past achievements and to plan for our future. While it is obviously true that conditions and restrictions of 2020 impacted our parish, both materially and spiritually, we have not been idle. We have used the time wisely to explore new and innovative ways to keep our community together and to plan for our future.

Who could have predicted how important the timing of our 2020 AMA Heavenly Sounds Campaign would be? The console of our beautiful Casavant organ has been restored and updated by its original makers and is awaiting re-installation. We have invested in a superb outdoor sound system for our masses in our Central Courtyard. We have been broadcasting mass on our website and our YouTube channel, which has enabled us to gather as a virtual community, and which is of particular benefit to those parishioners who are unable to attend mass in person.

It is time to launch our 2021 AMA (Annual Ministry Appeal). Our diocese has chosen the theme "Building a Family of Faith". I enclose an AMA information leaflet which indicates the range of ministries that you support by participating in the campaign. The first \$52,000 raised goes back to the diocese, and any sum we raise over that sum, comes back to our parish for RECOVERY and RENEWAL during our 250th Anniversary year. At Carmel Mission, we have set a total goal of \$250,000. We will use the additional \$198,000 to increase our efforts at building up our virtual family of faith. We plan to enhance our filming and digital communication capabilities through the investment in state of the art equipment and upgrades to our wireless infrastructure.

With the addition of our new Central Courtyard Restrooms, currently under construction, and the renovation of the Downie Museum and Basilica Forecourt, planned for this Spring, we will also invest in improving safety and access to our beautiful Mission. We will also expand our Museum exhibition space, in order to attract and welcome more visitors and pilgrims, whose support we greatly appreciate and rely on. We will share our progress towards achieving our goals on a dedicated page on our website and our weekly bulletin. In each of the past three years, your generosity has enabled us to achieve our AMA goals: Upgrade of Crespi Parish Hall, Renew Our Pews, and Heavenly Sounds. We could not have done this without you. I thank you from the bottom of my heart.

During this 250th Anniversary year, I know that I can count on your selfless stewardship and your generous support of our beautiful Carmel Mission.



DOCENT CORNER:

Church Bells and the Carmel Mission — Part 1

The use of bells in the Christian Church dates back to the 5th century when Saint Paulinus, the Bishop of Nola, introduced them as a means to summon monks to worship. In the 7th century Pope Sabinianus approved the use of bells to call the faithful to the Mass. By the 9th century the use of bells had spread to even the small parish churches of the Western Roman Empire. Before mass communication, they were the only way to gather the people of a village together, so they also served secular functions.

The faithful could tell from the bells if the service would be a sung High Mass or a recited Low Mass. Even today church bells let out a recognizable ring for the Angelus (usually at 6:00 AM, Noon, and 6:00 PM) that is distinct from wedding bells or the bells for a funeral. In many communities, especially in some European villages, a “passing bell” will be rung to signal the death of a parishioner, or in a monastery, the death of a monk.

It was not until the 13th century that outdoor tower bells began to be rung as “Sanctus bells” during the consecration portion (Holy, Holy, Holy....) part of the Mass. Tower bells are still used today for the Sanctus at St. Peter’s Basilica in the Vatican and a great many other historic churches and cathedrals. A close look at many of these older structures will often reveal a series of sighting holes (and sometimes mirrors) that were once used by bell-ringers to monitor the celebration of the Mass from bell-lofts so that the bells could be rung at the proper time.

Bells were used for telling time, announcing events, joyful and sad occasions, and even for passing on news. The ring of church bells, no matter what the occasion or time of day, was a summons to prayer whether for the souls of the departed, the recitation of the Angelus, a wedding or a call to worship at the Mass. The beautiful pealing of church bells can still be heard throughout the day when walking through the streets of Rome, Florence, Barcelona or Paris.

Besides the call to Christian prayer, the ringing of bells also has come to mean freedom:

- When the allied soldiers of WW II chased the Nazis out of local towns, the people in the town would ring the church bells. The bells rang out because they were now free from oppression and their lives were restored to normal.
- Our country celebrates freedom. “... From every mountain side, let freedom ring.” The Liberty Bell is a prized American symbol of freedom. Bells express freedom better than any other musical instrument.
- At Christmas time we ring bells because we are celebrating freedom from sin because the Messiah came into the world to save all of mankind. The Salvation Army rings bells that bring in donations, signaling freedom from hunger, homelessness and all types of poverty.
- Church bells ringing at the end of a wedding are a sign of good fortune to the bride and groom (and some say to scare away evil spirits).

Bells were vitally important to daily life at any mission. The bells were rung at mealtimes, to call the mission residents to work and to religious services, during births and funerals, to signal the approach of a ship or returning missionary, and at other times; novices were instructed in the intricate rituals associated with the ringing the mission bells. The daily routine began with sunrise Mass and morning prayers, followed by instruction of the natives in the teachings of the Roman Catholic faith.

Events at the Carmel Mission were signaled by the ringing of the Mission bells. Each day started around sunrise (about 6 AM). The Mission bells would ring to wake everyone and summon them to Mass and morning prayers. At noon, the bells would ring again for everyone to gather for the main meal. After an afternoon break, everyone returned to their work for another 2 to 4 hours depending on how much work there was to be done. A last bell would be rung to end the workday.

Besides the mission bells in the bell towers, there are a set of bells nearby that have a different origin and purpose. They are the El Camino Real Bell Markers. There is a green bell on a crooked staff located on the divider on Rio Road in front of the church. It is one of the many bell markers on the Camino Real. There is another identical bell 100 yards further up the road at the corner of Santa Lucia and Rio Road.

When they started to build highways in California, private groups placed distinctive mission bells along the route El Camino Real, hung on an 11-foot-high shepherd's crook described as "a Franciscan walking stick." Started in 1906, 450 bells were placed on this historic route and at the mission sites. The State of California eventually took over the markers and currently there are 555 bell markers. The bell marker consists of a cast metal bell set atop a crooked pipe column attached to a concrete foundation. The bells bear the inscription "1769 & 1906" and "El Camino Real."

There is a bell marker outside of Colton Hall in Monterey on Pacific Street. It contains a sign pointing directions to the Carmel Mission and San Carlos Cathedral. There are also 2 bell markers in the vicinity of the cathedral. There is a bell marker found at every Alta California Mission.

This insight into the Mission history was provided by the Carmel Mission Docent Association.
