FR. PAUL'S WEEKLY LETTER

Dear Friend of Carmel Mission,

In this year's lectionary cycle we are reading the Passion according to Luke. Each evangelist has his own style and his own focus in the Gospel narratives. In Luke's telling of the Passion story, Jesus's love and compassion for His disciples features quite prominently. Jesus knows He is going to suffer and die, and yet His concern is try and prepare His disciples for what is to come. He knows they are not ready, and are likely to desert Him when He needs them most. Jesus knows that, for all his good intentions, Peter is not up to the task of standing up for Him. Jesus knows that Judas has been taken over by jealousy and malice and will betray Him, but Jesus does not chastise or shame him. When Jesus sees Peter after Peter's denial, He looks directly at him, not to shame him, but so that Peter knows he is still loved, despite his failures.

The Passion of our Lord is a powerful, gut wrenching and somewhat gruesome story. The injustices perpetrated against Jesus are heartbreaking. But it is also a love story, perhaps the greatest love story of all time. In the Gethsemane, as He struggles to accept His Father's will, Jesus empties himself of everything except for love. This love carries Him above the insults and the torment. Jesus pours this love over His faithless disciples, over the injured servant whose ear He heals, over the mourning women of Jerusalem, over the thief by His side on the cross, over His very executioners.

In offering up His life, Jesus expresses His profound love for humanity. This is not an abstract love for the idea of humankind, this is an intimate, personal love. Jesus loves us because of who Jesus is, not who we are. He loves us despite our failings and our failures. His love is the balm for our wounds, and the inspiration to keep trying to be the being that God created in His image and likeness.

I wish you and your loved ones blessings of good health and great hope. As we enter this most sacred time please continue to pray for peace in our troubled world,

Scripture Message

Just before the Last Supper, "Satan entered into Judas, the one surnamed Iscariot" (Luke 22:3), and we recognize that the sword of Simeon's prophecy hangs over those whom we meet in the Last Supper narrative. Even with Jesus's chosen disciples, some will fall, some will rise, some will both fall and rise. Tonight the disciples recline around the table with Him; tomorrow all but one will lack the courage to be guests at the foot of the cross. Then it is off to the Mount of Olives, where Jesus struggles in agony to accept the Father's will, the disciples escape into sleep, their first betrayal. Arrested and falsely accused, Jesus is sent from one judge to another. All Jesus's friends are scattered; even Peter follows only "at a distance." He, too, is put on trial by a servant girl outside Pilate's courtroom, and a cock's crow brings in the verdict of shameful guilt. But when Jesus is brought out, he passes by Peter, turns and looks at him . . . and Peter is saved. He realizes that his Master will never turn away from him. Then he remembers his Master's words and weeps bitterly at their truth.. Scourged and mocked, Jesus is led out to His death. When some of the women of Jerusalem follow him like a mourning chorus, Jesus ministers to their grief but begs them to make it a larger lamentation for all those who are unfaithful to their God. On Golgotha, Jesus ministers also to the poor criminal who recognizes Him as a just one. Then Luke puts on Jesus's lips the words of Psalm 31: "Into your hands I commend my spirit," a gentler dying prayer than Mark's or Matthew's cry of "My God, my God, why have you abandoned me?" (Ps 22:2). Quietly, Jesus escapes, like an animal freed from a trap, into his Father's hands.

Carmel Mission received a generous donation from a family who wanted to find the right home for this unique/exquisite work of craftsmanship. This beautiful confessional fits in perfectly in this setting, as if it has been here for years.

Below is the history we were provided about the piece...



When an earthquake hit the south of France in the 1990's, a small village church crumbled

The church had decided not to try to rebuild, and in order to raise money to help the village recover, the church was selling whatever items it could salvage.

The collapse of the church roof damaged the door and the cross on the chapiteau, and the aged chene (oak) was cloaked in stone dust.

Gentle restoration experts repaired the damage, cleaned and waxed all surfaces many times with lavender beeswax.

The inscription above the door reads "M . le 2eme Vicaire" (second vicar, assistant to the curate)

Carmel Mission - An Ever Changing Diverse and Growing Collection – New Exhibits Planned



There has been a continuous acquisition and display of artifacts along with the development of the Mission property since the days of when the Mission was in ruins – just. Many lost artifacts have been retrieved, incorporated into our liturgical activities and displayed for posterity.



Over the past several years, we have cataloged, conserved and stored many donated objects in our collection.

We are looking forward to exhibiting many of these items as part of the planned expansion of our museum exhibitions.

We have created new conservation and storage rooms with temperature and moisture controlled environments.



MUSUEM COLLECTION

Carmel Mission exhibits many unique treasures with historic significance on full display.

- St. Junípero Serra and the Mission Basilica Shrine
The final resting place of Saint Junípero Serra, Founding Father of California
- The Caravaca Cross
The personal reliquary cross of Saint Junípero Serra, and one of the most important artifacts of California and Colonial Missionary History.
- Our Lady of Bethlehem Statue
The oldest European styled statue of Our Lady brought to Carmel by Saint Junípero Serra.
- The First Library of California
A treasure trove collection of colonial era books brought to Carmel by the Franciscan Missionaries.

Preservation, Conservation, Restoration

The terms preservation, conservation, and restoration are often used interchangeably in everyday use. However, these terms actually mean something quite different within the walls of a museum, and more so within the Mission, which utilizes many artifacts in celebration of the liturgy and sacraments.

Preservation - is the practice of maintaining artifacts by providing a stable storage or display environment in order to minimize further damage or deterioration.

- Museums can really only slow the process of deterioration. Preventive conservation is typically accomplished by controlling temperature, humidity, light, security, mishandling, and other potentially damaging agents.

Conservation - is the practice of mitigating further deterioration. Conservation, as performed by a knowledgeable conservator, may mean specialized cleaning or the removal of agents that cause damage. The goal is to treat an artifact so that it can be gently handled, safely stored or displayed without further risk of damage.

- Conservation is not an attempt to return an object to its original state, or to add new elements to the artifact. Those efforts are more commonly known as restoration.

Restoration - is the treatment of an object intended to return it to the approximate original appearance. Restoration equals permanent change. Cleaning and replacing significant parts, whether original to the object's manufacturer or not, alter the historical integrity of an artifact.

- Restorations play an important role in interpreting and retelling history because they provide a chance to share an often-intergenerational experience.





Our Advent theme, I Am For You, reminds us that our loving God is always on our side, despite any difficulties that we may have to encounter.




