Third Sunday in Lent Sunday, March 12, 2023

Dear Friend of Carmel Mission,

As we began the Lenten season I shared that our theme this Lent is "Thirsting for you, O God," and each week we have been singing "As the Deer Longs For Water," to remind us of the essential nature of God's presence in our lives. In the readings this Sunday, we encounter thirst as a central feature. In the First Reading from Exodus, the grumbling Israelites are thirsting in the desert until the Lord provides them water from a rock. In the Gospel, Jesus begins an unlikely but highly illustrative encounter with the woman at the well with a request for a drink of water. Water is crucial to life, just as God is.

Jesus' encounter with the woman at the well has several unlikely aspects. For one, Jewish men at the time did not converse with women in public. For another, she was a Samaritan, a long time enemy of the Jews, divided over beliefs about the proper place to worship. But Jesus is not put off by the superficial differences of gender and culture, and to her credit, neither is the woman. She could have turned back and avoided perceived scandal, but instead she engaged, and her life was forever changed.

What does it take to be an evangelist? We have many wonderful examples of evangelism in our Catholic tradition, not least our own founder and first pastor, St. Junipero. But evangelism is not just the work of the saints, or the ordained, or the scholarly, or the righteous. It is your work, and mine, and that of all who follow Christ. Evangelization can carry a connotation of uncomfortable coercion or disregarding the diverse beliefs and traditions of our brothers and sisters. The example of the Samaritan woman at the well shows us, at its heart, it is anything but forcing belief on others. The woman feels compelled to share the grace and freedom Jesus offered her, not to force that on her neighbors, but to make sure they did not miss out. Jesus does the rest, until they all believe for themselves that Jesus is the savior of the world.

As we continue our Lenten journey, I encourage you to join me this week in the work of evangelization by showing the joy, healing, and freedom that relationship with God brings us, and inviting others to come drink of His life-giving water.

I wish you and your loved ones Lenten blessings of good health, renewed hope, and courage in sharing our faith,

Scripture Message

When John wrote his Gospel, he was well aware that Samaria had been the first region beyond Jerusalem to receive the good news (Acts 8:2-9 and 9:31). John is writing after the historical fact of the acceptance of the Gospel, but he sees it as what it truly is: an encounter with Jesus through the preaching of early church. An intelligent, daring woman is at the center of the radical inclusiveness for which our contemporary church is still striving. Then as now, Jesus makes those who respond to him sharers in His freedom. The despised woman – who comes to the well in the scorching heat of middle day to avoid the judgmental eyes and tongues of those who gather at the cooler times of day – hurries back to her own town. She is no longer ashamed of the story of her life, because she has a more urgent story to tell about the man who lowered a bucket into the well of her soul and drew up the deep living water within her. She has been helped to see what she is looking for, what her inner reality and truth are, and she must worship the God of this truth. John presents us with a litany of names for Jesus. First the woman address Him as "Jew" then "prophet." As she hesitates to call him "Messiah" or "the Christ" He reveals Himself as the I AM in human presence. When the disciples return they are shocked, not only was Jesus talking to a Samaritan, He was relating to a woman! What Jesus tells them is that He has food they nothing about: the woman's questions, her insights, her energy and acceptance have nourished Him, for in such a healing encounter he is doing the work of the One who sent Him, and sowing in Samaria the grain that will be harvested for eternal life. The woman announces to her village what she experienced with Jesus, but until they experience Him personally they cannot truly believe. Only after they have had this personal encounter can they all recognize him as "savior of the world."

Act of Spiritual Communion

My Jesus,

I believe that You are present in
the Most Holy Sacrament.

I love You above all things,
and I desire to receive You into my soul.

Since I cannot at this moment
receive You sacramentally,

come at least spiritually into my heart.

I embrace You as if You were already there
and unite myself wholly to You.

Never permit me to be separated from You.

Amen.

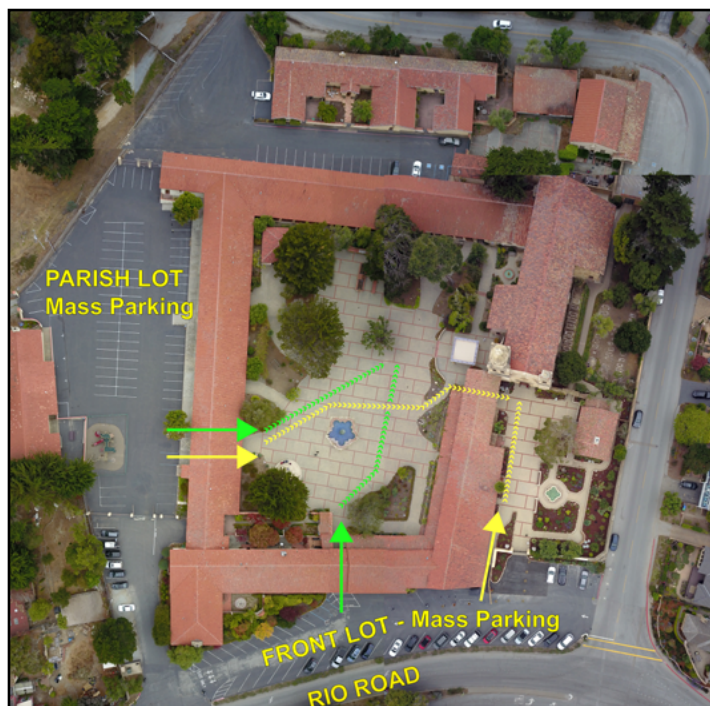
Mass Entrance

Carmel Mission Book Club

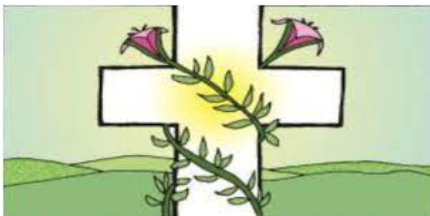
Book Club meets on Friday afternoons at 1:30 in Crespi Hall.

St. Patrick's Day

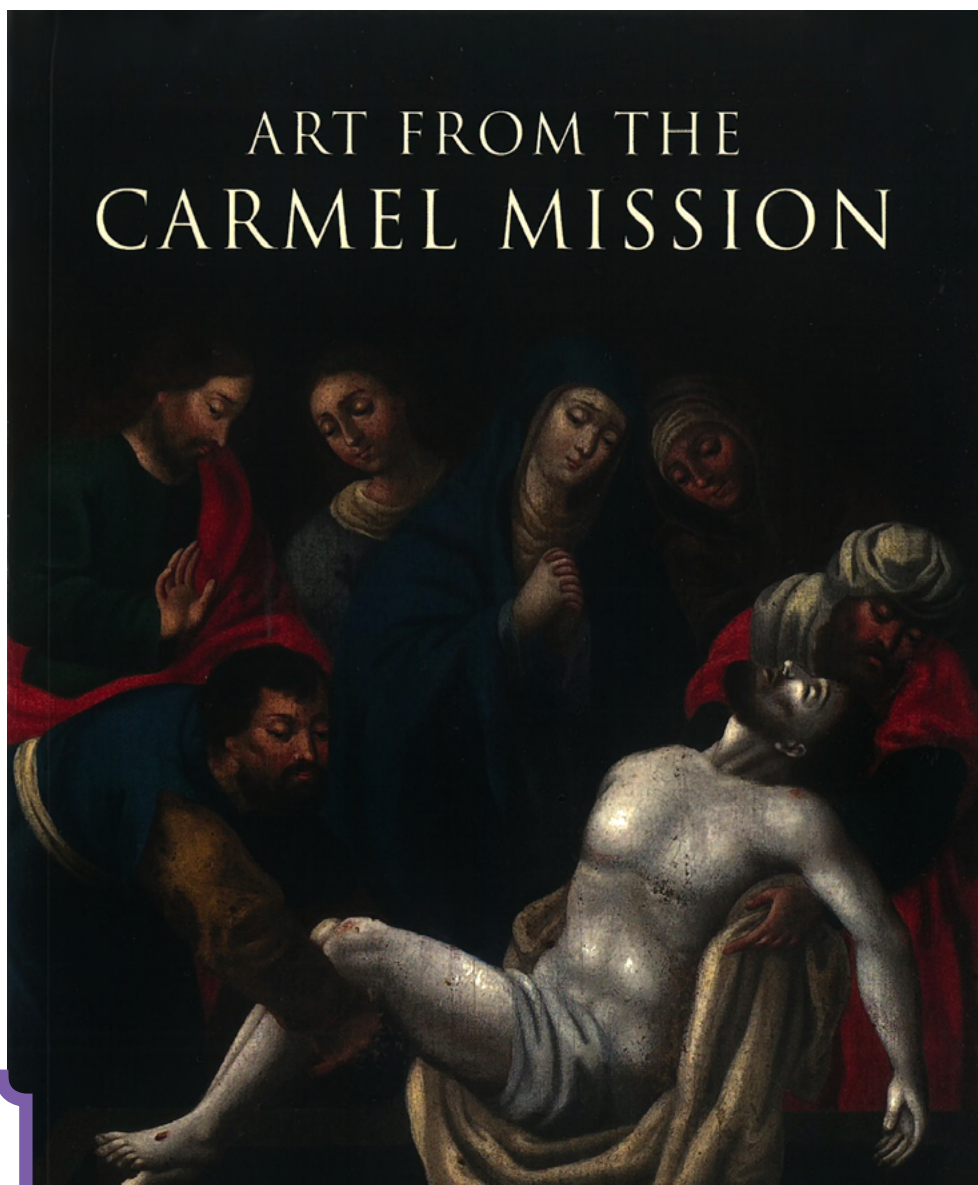
According to the Confessio of Patrick, when he was about 16, he was captured by Irish pirates from his home in Great Britain, and taken as a slave to Ireland, looking after animals, where he lived for six years before escaping and returning to his family. After becoming a cleric, he returned to northern and western Ireland. In later life, he served as a bishop, but little is known about the places where he worked. By the seventh century, he had already come to be revered as the patron saint of Ireland. Saint Patrick's Day is observed on March 17, the supposed date of his death. It is celebrated inside and outside Ireland as a religious and cultural holiday.

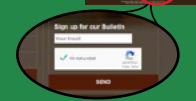

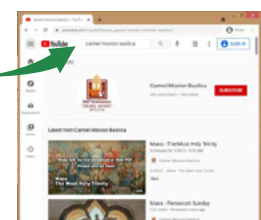


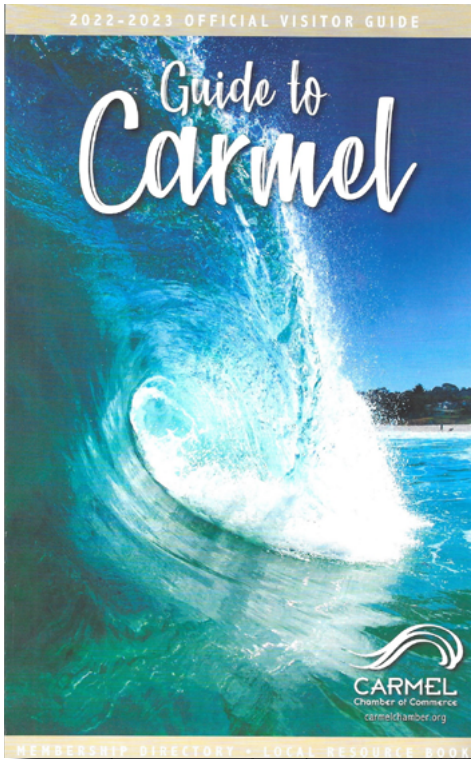

Carmel Mission Basilica is being advertised in the Guide to Carmel

a Franciscan friar whose task was the creation of a chain of missions along the coast of Alta California. In 1771, Serra located Mission San Carlos de Borromeo de Carmelo at the mouth of what is now Carmel Valley, a spot he described as "a locality indeed most delightful and suitable because of the extreme and excellent quality of the land and the water supply necessary for abundant harvests." Serra ultimately founded nine missions, but this remained his headquarters and favorite. He is buried here.

A LITTLE CARMEL HISTORY

By 1835, Carmel, like the other missions, was secularized and its extensive land holdings divided among several large ranchos, pieces of which ultimately formed Carmel-by-the-Sea. The mission buildings slowly fell to ruin and weren't fully restored until Harry Downie began a meticulous restoration in 1931.

The Carmel Development Company sent out its first brochure in May of 1903 addressed "To the School teachers of California and other

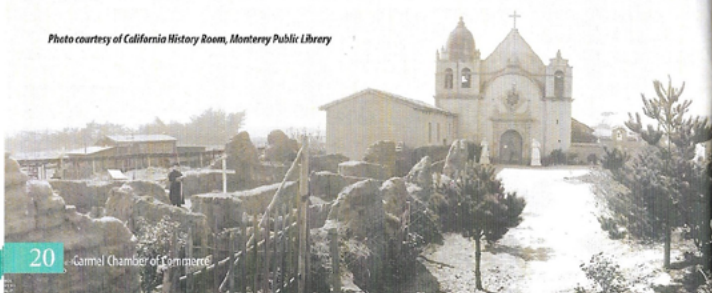
professors from Stanford and the University of California began to buy lots and build small cabins in the woods. The earthquake of 1906 brought refugees from San Francisco, many of them artists and writers, drawn by the beauty and affordable prices.

Enticed by enthusiastic reports of Carmel's charms and affordable lifestyle, a number of these free spirits moved to the village where they became known as the "Bohemians." George and Carrie Sterling formed the center of a loosely structured group of friends that included among its members Mary Austin, Jack London, James Hopper, Herbert Heron and Sinclair Lewis. The Bohemians often gathered at the beach for abalone feasts, fine conversation and libations.

Vigilant stewardship has preserved the incomparable natural setting of coastline and beach. Trees are a vital element of the village landscape and citizens hold dear Carmel's history and sense of community. Residents treasure their village. They have resisted change and worked to protect the legacy left by earlier citizens.
