

A legacy gift does not alter your current lifestyle in any way and allows you to leave a legacy without giving up your assets.

It is important to note that the bequest is revocable, allowing you to change your mind at any time should your circumstances change.

# Relieving the Tax Burden of Retirement Plan Assets

As a nonprofit entity, the Mission is tax-exempt from any federal taxes. When you name Carmel Mission as a beneficiary of your retirement plan assets (IRA, 401k, etc.) or include us in your other estate plan, the parish is eligible to receive the full amount of your legacy gift.

With your permission, we will recognize your planned gift with a permanent listing on our Carmel Mission Legacy Society donor display located on the Mission grounds and on our website. Your generosity will also be acknowledged annually during a special mass dedicated to our legacy society members, along with an invitation to attend a reception following the service.

The Carmel Mission has been the spiritual home to many Catholic families on the Monterey Peninsula for more than 150 years. # Legacy Society FAQ

"The act of giving without the expectation of something in return is the true definition of kindness."

#### What is the purpose of our Legacy Society?

The Carmel Mission Legacy Society was established to protect and sustain the future financial viability and spiritual life of Carmel Mission as a holy place of worship and Christian service in the Catholic Diocese of Monterey.

#### How does a parishioner become a member?

To become a member, parishioners (or friends of Carmel Mission) fill out a short form indicating their intent to leave a bequest in their will, trust, retirement account, etc., for the benefit of Carmel Mission.

# Is there a minimum pledge amount required?

No. A pledge for any amount, small or large, will be gratefully accepted. It could be a specific amount or a percentage of one's estate, such as 1%, 2%, or more.

# Is the amount of the bequest disclosed when a parishioner becomes a member?

No. Simply put, the amount of any legacy gift is between the member and Our Lord.

#### What is the source of Legacy Society funds?

After they pass to eternal life, funds are bequeathed to Carmel Mission from members' wills and trusts, retirement plans, etc.

# So, membership in the Legacy Society is not about contributing now?

No, not now. Membership is about parishioners and friends leaving funds to Carmel Mission after departing this life and entering eternal life.

# What happens to the Legacy Society's funds from members' wills, trusts, retirement accounts, etc.?

These funds are held in a special account and used for various purposes. Examples include significant repairs and improvements to our Mission facilities, upgrading Mission equipment, unforeseen emergencies, and

various Mission ministries where funding is not possible from the Mission's general funds.

#### What are these funds NOT used for?

Legacy Society funds are not used for everyday Mission expenses.

# If I/we decide to become a Society member, do I/we have to visit our attorney to change our will, trust, etc.?

If you leave a legacy gift from your will or trust, you can use the internet to find forms indicating your intentions. You would then place these forms with your will or trust papers. In the case of a will, the form is called a codicil. In the case of a trust, it is called an amendment. You may feel more comfortable having an attorney do this for you.

## What about leaving a legacy gift from our retirement accounts?

Generally, all that is required is for you to go online or contact whoever is holding your retirement account and indicate that you want to include Carmel Mission as a beneficiary and for what % of the account value. Remember to include Carmel Mission's Federal Tax ID Number, 94-165-8139.

# What other ways could a Legacy Society member leave a legacy gift to Carmel Mission?

In addition to bequests in wills, trusts and retirement accounts, other ways to leave a legacy gift include real estate, stock, charitable gift annuities, bank accounts, certificates of deposit, and life insurance policies.

# Are there tax advantages to leaving a bequest from a retirement account (IRA, 401K, etc.)

Yes. Funds left for Carmel Mission would generally be free of state and federal income tax. (If left to individuals (heirs), funds are taxed at rates for ordinary income. Check with your tax advisor for more detailed information about this important tax implication.)

#### Would the church have to pay tax on any legacy gifts?

No. Legacy gifts left for Carmel Mission are free from federal and state taxes.

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Our hearts go out to all who have been impacted by the recent torrential rains and flooding these last few weeks. All four counties of our Diocese have been profoundly affected. Some of the worst flooding we have witnessed has left many homeless in the Pajaro Valley, yet in so many other places that unfortunately go unnoticed. Victim needs include emergency housing, food, clothing, and in some cases temporary replacement income.

Our beautiful agricultural fields and mountains have been impacted, but in so many cases the working poor are the most affected, not only losing their homes, but also their source of income.

Many people are asking "How can we help the people that have lost so much?" Our diocesan Catholic Charities is now partnering with other non-profit groups to assist these victims in their long-term recovery.

I am asking our pastors to take up a **special collection** in the next two weeks as well, for disaster relief. Be assured this money too, will be used for long term recovery for the survivors of this crisis via our Catholic Charities.

I am sure there will be more requests for items that families may need, but until we can get into these affected areas and evaluate the situations, we presently ask for your financial assistance.

Last, but not least, we pray for all who have had their lives turned upside down by this natural disaster. Pope Francis reminds us to especially help those most poor on the peripheries, in their time of need. Thank you for your generosity in this time of need. Many thanks go also to the first responders who so quickly helped those whose lives were in danger. May Our Lady of Guadalupe watch over us and shelter us with her tender care.

## **Scripture Message**

Today's remarkable Gospel story proclaims that no one is so far gone into death that Jesus cannot call him or her back to life, for He is the resurrection and the life , which is more than just physical life, in the present as well as on the other side of death. Martha and Mary are models for our journey - never a straight line event – to profound faith. Mary and Martha reverse roles here. Where Mary once sat in at the feet of Jesus, she now sits at home with her grief. It is Martha, once too busy to listen, who comes to Him with her trust in His help and His love. She does not see the complete picture, for Jesus is still in the process of revealing all that His life means for the world. She professes a typical Jewish belief in resurrection on the last day, the day of judgment and resurrection at the same time. But in John's Gospel it is important that faith is not just focused on a distant event, but is a death defying affirmation of the reality of God's presence in Jesus. To Martha, Jesus proclaims, "I am the resurrection and the life," and Marth professes her faith in Him as the Messiah, the Son of God. The others mourners appear, and Mary makes a straight for Jesus. Together they move towards the tomb of Lazarus. There Jesus weeps tears of sorrow for His friend, and tears of anger at the last enemy, death, which he has come to destroy. He prays to the Father, and then summons Lazarus out of the tomb and back to life. In the first reading, God reveals through Ezekiel that death does not have the final say. Despite death's appearance of permanence, God's power is greater still, and what God wants for us is life. We see in the Gospel, the beginning of the "fullness of redemption" promised in the psalm. Jesus' work of healing the sick and the blind has been a prelude to this - the restoration of life even to those who are dead. The second reading affirms that while our bodies may die, this is no longer the end it once was. Christ's spirit living in us allows us to share in Hs triumph over death.



### **Carmel Mission Book Club**


Book Club meets on Friday afternoons at 1:30 in Crespi Hall.



The **Bible Study** holds weekly meetings to study and discuss various books of the Bible.

The **Book Club** holds weekly meetings to read and discuss selected books.

The **Carmel Mission Docent Ministry** provides historical stewardship for the Mission and its art and artifacts. The Docents provide a welcoming presence and historical information to our many visitors.

The **Women's & Men's I-HELP** (Interfaith Homeless Emergency Lodging Program) activities at Carmel Mission are one of the many Monterey Peninsula churches, faith communities, or service organizations that provide overnight accommodation, a nutritious hot meal, and a caring community to homeless men and women one evening a month.

The **Knights of Columbus** were founded in 1882 on the principles of charity, unity and fraternity. The Carmel Mission, Council 4593, Knights of Columbus, provides hospitality and fundraising support to our parish community.

The **Liturgical Ministry** supports all aspects of our parish liturgy.





## Initial Repair to the Storefront wall has been completed!




