Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion Sunday, April 2, 2023

Dear Friend of Carmel Mission,

Today is the only day in our liturgical year when we hear two Gospel readings. We begin with Jesus' triumphal entrance into Jerusalem to shouts of "King" and "Son of David." We end with Jesus on the cross, mocked by the very same crowd. Praise and vilification, joy and despair, all in the span of a single hour. This is the drama of Salvation, and it is played out in all its ugliness and cruelty, culminating in all its shining glory in the hope of the Resurrection and its promise of new life.

These Gospel readings are not just historical narratives. The procession with palms and the reading of the Passion are not just dramatic recreations. It is a description of our own reality today. Each of us can praise and vilify, sometimes in the same sentence. Each of us experiences joy and despair, sometimes within minutes of each other. Each of us contains all aspects of all the characters in the drama - Peter and Judas, Pilate, the women who braved the horrors of the Cross to stay by Jesus 'side, and the men who fled and abandoned Him early on. They all, good, bad, and indifferent, reside in ourselves. And in the center of this storm is Jesus Christ, the Suffering Servant who loved the world, and each of us, to death.

We do not have a post Passion encounter with the characters, per se. We do not know how well Pilate slept, or did not sleep, that night. Or who from the crowd regretted their part but doubled down on their behavior to save face and hide from a part of themselves they despise. We do not know - but we do know, because we know how those parts of ourselves react in the face of such love.

As we journey together as a community through this Holy Week, I invite you to join me in unflinchingly exposing to God the parts of ourselves in need of healing, in need of forgiveness, in need of grace. Jesus plunges into the darkest depths of our humanity and draws us up into the brightest light of the Father's love. May this healing light be a balm for our wounds, a comfort for our sorrow, and a spark for our imagination.

I wish you and your loved ones Passiontide blessings of good health, new hope, and a new appreciation of God's immense love for you ,

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Our hearts go out to all who have been impacted by the recent torrential rains and flooding these last few weeks. All four counties of our Diocese have been profoundly affected. Some of the worst flooding we have witnessed has left many homeless in the Pajaro Valley, yet in so many other places that unfortunately go unnoticed. Victim needs include emergency housing, food, clothing, and in some cases temporary replacement income.

Our beautiful agricultural fields and mountains have been impacted, but in so many cases the working poor are the most affected, not only losing their homes, but also their source of income.

Many people are asking "How can we help the people that have lost so much?" Our diocesan Catholic Charities is now partnering with other non-profit groups to assist these victims in their long-term recovery.

If you desire to financially assist those directly affected by the floods, please go to www.catholiccharitiesdom.org for guidance on how to donate. I am asking our pastors to take up a **special collection** in the next two weeks as well, for disaster relief. Be assured this money too, will be used for long term recovery for the survivors of this crisis via our Catholic Charities.

I am sure there will be more requests for items that families may need, but until we can get into these affected areas and evaluate the situations, we presently ask for your financial assistance.

Last, but not least, we pray for all who have had their lives turned upside down by this natural disaster. Pope Francis reminds us to especially help those most poor on the peripheries, in their time of need. Thank you for your generosity in this time of need. Many thanks go also to the first responders who so quickly helped those whose lives were in danger. May Our Lady of Guadalupe watch over us and shelter us with her tender care.

Scripture Message

The paired Gospels of this Sunday give us the whole narrative arc of Holy Week. The triumph of Jesus' entrance into Jerusalem contrasts sharply with the crowds that turn on Him in the passion narrative. One moment though, brings us back to the truth. The centurion, a most unexpected source, affirms that this man truly was the Son of God. This is not the only time the passion narrative upends expectations. The women epitomize bravery, staying near the grisly scene of the cross while the disciples who had staunchly avowed their bravery are the first to run away. Religious leaders insist on Jesus' death while the occupying government tries to find ways to release Him. Jesus' death does not happen quietly but disturbs the earth and the natural world itself. We do not hear the end of the story today, the resurrection to which we look forward., but we can see very clearly that God is doing something new. The psalm is heart breaking but relatable. We will all likely experience a moment where we feel abandoned by God. The demands of our faith do not always reward us with warm feelings that reassure us of God's presence and approval. But the psalmist issues a reminder; even without those pleasant feelings, even when we feel abandoned, we can rely on the discipline of our faith and we can still praise our God who deserves our whole hearted trust even when all feels lost. This is the God who brings life out of death. The first reading provides the first moment of stark contrast between the triumphant procession and the gravity of the passion. The glory of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem was not for its own sake. The beautiful second reading captures this paradox in all its fullness: Jesus shares God's being by rights but chooses to humble Himself to death. It is this humility which allows His even greater exaltation and the worship we now bring the One who gives us life.




FAITH IN OUR FUTURE AMA 2023

Legacy Society FAQ

"The act of giving without the expectation of something in return is the true definition of kindness."

What is the purpose of our Legacy Society?

The Carmel Mission Legacy Society was established to protect and sustain the future financial viability and spiritual life of Carmel Mission as a holy place of worship and Christian service in the Catholic Diocese of Monterey.

How does a parishioner become a member?

To become a member, parishioners (or friends of Carmel Mission) fill out a short form indicating their intent to leave a bequest in their will, trust, retirement account, etc., for the benefit of Carmel Mission.

Is there a minimum pledge amount required?

No. A pledge for any amount, small or large, will be gratefully accepted. It could be a specific amount or a percentage of one's estate, such as 1%, 2%, or more.

Is the amount of the bequest disclosed when a parishioner becomes a member?

No. Simply put, the amount of any legacy gift is between the member and Our Lord.

What is the source of Legacy Society funds?

After they pass to eternal life, funds are bequeathed to Carmel Mission from members' wills and trusts, retirement plans, etc.

So, membership in the Legacy Society is not about contributing now?

No, not now. Membership is about parishioners and friends leaving funds to Carmel Mission after departing this life and entering eternal life.

What happens to the Legacy Society's funds from members' wills, trusts, retirement accounts, etc.?

These funds are held in a special account and used for various purposes. Examples include significant repairs and improvements to our Mission facilities, upgrading Mission equipment, unforeseen emergencies, and

various Mission ministries where funding is not possible from the Mission's general funds.

What are these funds NOT used for?

Legacy Society funds are not used for everyday Mission expenses.

If I/we decide to become a Society member, do I/we have to visit our attorney to change our will, trust, etc.?

If you leave a legacy gift from your will or trust, you can use the internet to find forms indicating your intentions. You would then place these forms with your will or trust papers. In the case of a will, the form is called a codicil. In the case of a trust, it is called an amendment. You may feel more comfortable having an attorney do this for you.

What about leaving a legacy gift from our retirement accounts?

Generally, all that is required is for you to go online or contact whoever is holding your retirement account and indicate that you want to include Carmel Mission as a beneficiary and for what % of the account value. Remember to include Carmel Mission's Federal Tax ID Number, 94-165-8139.

What other ways could a Legacy Society member leave a legacy gift to Carmel Mission?

In addition to bequests in wills, trusts and retirement accounts, other ways to leave a legacy gift include real estate, stock, charitable gift annuities, bank accounts, certificates of deposit, and life insurance policies.

Are there tax advantages to leaving a bequest from a retirement account (IRA, 401K, etc.)

Yes. Funds left for Carmel Mission would generally be free of state and federal income tax. (If left to individuals (heirs), funds are taxed at rates for ordinary income. Check with your tax advisor for more detailed information about this important tax implication.)

Would the church have to pay tax on any legacy gifts?

No. Legacy gifts left for Carmel Mission are free from federal and state taxes.

Carmel Mission Book Club


Book Club meets on Friday afternoons at 1:30 in Crespi Hall.







The **Women's & Men's I-HELP** (Interfaith Homeless Emergency Lodging Program) activities at Carmel Mission are one of the many Monterey Peninsula churches, faith communities, or service organizations that provide overnight accommodation, a nutritious hot meal, and a caring community to homeless men and women one evening a month.

The **Knights of Columbus** were founded in 1882 on the principles of charity, unity and fraternity. The Carmel Mission, Council 4593, Knights of Columbus, provides hospitality and fundraising support to our parish community.



from Stanford and the University of California began to buy lots and build small cabins in the woods. The earthquake of 1906 brought refugees from San Francisco, many of them artists and writers, drawn by the beauty and affordable prices.

Enticed by enthusiastic reports of Carmel's charms and affordable lifestyle, a number of these free spirits moved to the village where they became known as the "Bohemians." George and Carrie Sterling formed the center of a loosely structured group of friends that included among its members Mary Austin, Jack London, James Hopper, Herbert Heron and Sinclair Lewis. The Bohemians often gathered at the beach for abalone feasts, fine conversation and libations.


Vigilant stewardship has preserved the incomparable natural setting of coastline and beach. Trees are a vital element of the village landscape and citizens hold dear Carmel's history and sense of community. Residents treasure their village. They have resisted change and worked to protect the legacy left by earlier citizens.


of missions along the coast of Alta California. In 1771, Serra located Mission San Carlos de Borromeo de Carmelo at the mouth of what is now Carmel Valley, a spot he described as "a locality indeed most delightful and suitable because of the excreme and excellent quality of the land and the water supply necessary for abundant harvests." Serra ultimately founded nine missions, but this remained his headquarters and favorite. He is buried here.

By 1835, Carmel, like the other missions, was secularized and its extensive land holdings divided among several large ranchos, pieces of which ultimately formed Carmel-by-the-Sea. The mission buildings slowly fell to ruin and weren't fully restored until Harry Downie began a meticulous restoration in 1931.

The Carmel Development Company sent out its first brochure in May of 1903 addressed "To the School teachers of California and other
