

The Resurrection of the Lord Sunday, April 9, 2023

Dear Friend of Carmel Mission,

Alleluia! He Is Risen! Jesus has returned to life from death, fulfilling His promise, and ensuring that we too may share in eternal life with Him. It is a moment of triumph for our God, and rejoicing for all who love and follow Him throughout the generations. We hear two accounts of the resurrection, one from Matthew at the Easter Vigil, and one from John on Easter Sunday. The two share one thing in common: it is women to whom Jesus' resurrection is first revealed.

The women have never abandoned their vigil or their care for their friend and teacher, Jesus. They believe that Jesus was the Messiah, the Son of God, and they had heard Him say that He was the resurrection and the life (John 11:25), but they did not understand what this meant (John 20:9). How could they? Even with two thousand years of hindsight and contemplation we can barely begin to comprehend the reality of His return to life from death. They are not waiting for Jesus to come back to life. But they are not ready to leave Him either. They believe that their expressions of love and care have significance, even if they cannot change the circumstances or the outcome. It is a beautiful aspect of our human nature that we are so often driven to return, to strive, to persist, and to care even against all odds.

Our Easter narratives show us a sorrowful vigil that is transformed by an astonishing miracle. This Easter season, I invite you to join me in considering the ways that the spirit of the resurrection may be in the vigil itself, in the ways we keep trying each day to demonstrate love, mercy and compassion, in a world that often seems unreceptive and hostile. We live in hope, but we know we may not always see the fruit of our labor. Or, as the Easter story demonstrates, the miracle God has in store for us may be beyond our wildest imaginings.

I wish you and your loved ones Easter blessings of good health, new hope, and great joy in the Risen Christ,

Scripture Message

The beginning of the Gospel reading finds Mary Magdalene coming to the tomb early in the morning while it was still dark. The narrative quickly shifts to what is unusual about the scene - Mary notices the stone is has been removed from the tomb. Without a doubt, that is a tremendous and paradigm shifting occurrence. When Simon Peter and the other disciple arrive at the tomb and realize that Jesus is no longer dead, or at least no longer housed in the tomb, one layer of this incredible event is revealed. Christ's physical resurrection demonstrates the mighty power of God. It bears witness to God's abiding love for humankind, a love that declares, I love you so much that I will journey with you into death and bring you out on the other side." What is bringing Mary Magdalene to the tomb in the morning can get lost in the furor that follows. She and the other women have been visiting the tomb and tending to Jesus' body in the days between the crucifixion and the resurrection. They overcame fear of judgement or even violence from their community, who were incited to seek Jesus' destruction, to care for Him, even in death. Gripped with the grief of losing their dearest reading and the shock of watching their spiritual leader suffer an ignominious death, they remained committed to the only ministry left to them in the that moment. The women exhibit a love and devotion, a tenacity of spirit, in returning to profound trauma over and over. Not fully understanding that Jesus would rise from the dead, they believed that their love held significance even if they could not change the circumstances. This Easter narrative shows us a mournful vigil that culminates in an astonishing and miraculous revelation. It is also a reminder that the spirit of resurrection is also present in the perpetual vigil.



Relieving the Tax Burden of Retirement Plan Assets

As a nonprofit entity, the Mission is tax-exempt from any federal taxes. When you name Carmel Mission as a beneficiary of your retirement plan assets (IRA, 401k, etc.) or include us in your other estate plan, the parish is eligible to receive the full amount of your legacy gift.

With your permission, we will recognize your planned gift with a permanent listing on our Carmel Mission Legacy Society donor display located on the Mission grounds and on our website. Your generosity will also be acknowledged annually during a special mass dedicated to our legacy society members, along with an invitation to attend a reception following the service.

Legacy Society FAQ

"The act of giving without the expectation of something in return is the true definition of kindness."

What is the purpose of our Legacy Society?

The Carmel Mission Legacy Society was established to protect and sustain the future financial viability and spiritual life of Carmel Mission as a holy place of worship and Christian service in the Catholic Diocese of Monterey.

How does a parishioner become a member?

To become a member, parishioners (or friends of Carmel Mission) fill out a short form indicating their intent to leave a bequest in their will, trust, retirement account, etc., for the benefit of Carmel Mission.

Is there a minimum pledge amount required?

No. A pledge for any amount, small or large, will be gratefully accepted. It could be a specific amount or a percentage of one's estate, such as 1%, 2%, or more.

Is the amount of the bequest disclosed when a parishioner becomes a member?

No. Simply put, the amount of any legacy gift is between the member and Our Lord.

What is the source of Legacy Society funds?

After they pass to eternal life, funds are bequeathed to Carmel Mission from members' wills and trusts, retirement plans, etc.

So, membership in the Legacy Society is not about contributing now?

No, not now. Membership is about parishioners and friends leaving funds to Carmel Mission after departing this life and entering eternal life.

What happens to the Legacy Society's funds from members' wills, trusts, retirement accounts, etc.?

These funds are held in a special account and used for various purposes. Examples include significant repairs and improvements to our Mission facilities, upgrading Mission equipment, unforeseen emergencies, and

various Mission ministries where funding is not possible from the Mission's general funds.

What are these funds NOT used for?

Legacy Society funds are not used for everyday Mission expenses.

If I/we decide to become a Society member, do I/we have to visit our attorney to change our will, trust, etc.?

If you leave a legacy gift from your will or trust, you can use the internet to find forms indicating your intentions. You would then place these forms with your will or trust papers. In the case of a will, the form is called a codicil. In the case of a trust, it is called an amendment. You may feel more comfortable having an attorney do this for you.

What about leaving a legacy gift from our retirement accounts?

Generally, all that is required is for you to go online or contact whoever is holding your retirement account and indicate that you want to include Carmel Mission as a beneficiary and for what % of the account value. Remember to include Carmel Mission's Federal Tax ID Number, 94-165-8139.

What other ways could a Legacy Society member leave a legacy gift to Carmel Mission?

In addition to bequests in wills, trusts and retirement accounts, other ways to leave a legacy gift include real estate, stock, charitable gift annuities, bank accounts, certificates of deposit, and life insurance policies.

Are there tax advantages to leaving a bequest from a retirement account (IRA, 401K, etc.)

Yes. Funds left for Carmel Mission would generally be free of state and federal income tax. (If left to individuals (heirs), funds are taxed at rates for ordinary income. Check with your tax advisor for more detailed information about this important tax implication.)

Would the church have to pay tax on any legacy gifts?

No. Legacy gifts left for Carmel Mission are free from federal and state taxes.

Carmel Mission Book Club


Book Club meets on Friday afternoons at 1:30 in Crespi Hall.

The **Altar Society** provides care and upkeep for the altar linens and supports additional needs of the altar.

The **Carmel Mission Bereavement Ministry** provides caring consolation and spiritual support to parish families who are grieving the death of a loved one.

The **Bible Study** holds weekly meetings to study and discuss various books of the Bible.

The **Book Club** holds weekly meetings to read and discuss selected books.

The **Carmel Mission Docent Ministry** provides historical stewardship for the Mission and its art and artifacts. The Docents provide a welcoming presence and historical information to our many visitors.

Eucharistic Adoration is a special devotion whereby worshipers dedicate their time to be present with Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament to honor, adore and pray to Him.

The Faith Formation Ministry provides religious education for the faithful of all ages.

The **Falge Farmworkers Program Ministry** procures and distributes food and clothing to farmworkers and their families, who are in need.

The **Homebound Eucharistic Ministry** practices the Corporal works of mercy. Members visit and comfort the sick and the elderly, and bring Communion to those who have difficulty attending Mass.

The **Women's & Men's I-HELP** (Interfaith Homeless Emergency Lodging Program) activities at Carmel Mission are one of the many Monterey Peninsula churches, faith communities, or service organizations that provide overnight accommodation, a nutritious hot meal, and a caring community to homeless men and women one evening a month.

The **Knights of Columbus** were founded in 1882 on the principles of charity, unity and fraternity. The Carmel Mission, Council 4593, Knights of Columbus, provides hospitality and fundraising support to our parish community.

The **Liturgical Ministry** supports all aspects of our parish liturgy.



professors from Stanford and the University of California began to buy lots and build small cabins in the woods. The earthquake of 1906 brought refugees from San Francisco, many of them artists and writers, drawn by the beauty and affordable prices.

Enticed by enthusiastic reports of Carmel's charms and affordable lifestyle, a number of these free spirits moved to the village where they became known as the "Bohemians." George and Carrie Sterling formed the center of a loosely structured group of friends that included among its members Mary Austin, Jack London, James Hopper, Herbert Heron and Sindair Lewis. The Bohemians often gathered at the beach for abalone feasts, fine conversation and libations.

Vigilant stewardship has preserved the incomparable natural setting of coastline and beach. Trees are a vital element of the village landscape and citizens hold dear Carmel's history and sense of community. Residents treasure their village. They have resisted change and worked to protect the legacy left by earlier citizens.

of missions along the coast of Alta California. In 1771, Serra located Mission San Carlos de Borromeo de Carmelo at the mouth of what is now Carmel Valley, a spot he described as "a locality indeed most delightful and suitable because of the excreme and excellent quality of the land and the water supply necessary for abundant harvests." Serra ultimately founded nine missions, but this remained his headquarters and favorite. He is buried here.

A LITTLE CARMEL HISTORY

By 1835, Carmel, like the other missions, was secularized and its extensive land holdings divided among several large ranchos, pieces of which ultimately formed Carmel-by-the-Sea. The mission buildings slowly fell to ruin and weren't fully restored until Harry Downie began a meticulous restoration in 1931.

The Carmel Development Company sent out its first brochure in May of 1903 addressed "To the School teachers of California and other"




