Dear Friend of Carmel Mission,

Just as we have the familiar post-Christmas story of the Magi's visit to the Christ Child, we hear today the story of the journey to Emmaus- a beloved and familiar post-Resurrection story.

Both are significant because they offer ideas of how disciples through the generations may continue to interact with Jesus. Relatively few individuals actually encountered Jesus in the time of His earthly ministry, and fewer still saw Him after His glorious resurrection from the dead. The vast majority of disciples would need to encounter and engage with Jesus in a different, but equally potent, way. The experience of Cleopas and his companion offers indications of how this will be possible. They are walking along with Jesus, having no idea of who He is. They begin to get a stirring in their hearts when He is discussing and revealing the Sacred Scripture to them, and the revelation is complete when He breaks the bread.

We know that Jesus is truly present today and always in the Word, in the Eucharist, and in the community gathered together. I felt this so poignantly in the beginning of the pandemic, when the only way we could be together was virtually. It was certainly a surreal experience to celebrate the Resurrection of the Lord in an empty Basilica in 2020. However, despite the strangeness, there was never a doubt in my mind as to the presence of Jesus in our community, albeit in a necessarily novel way, and to the true presence of Jesus in the manner we, and so many disciples before and after us will encounter Him - in the Scriptures, in the Eucharist, and in one another.

The Emmaus disciples pose an important question after their encounter with the Risen Christ: "Were our hearts not burning within us?" Theologian and civil rights activist Howard Thurman said, "Don't ask what the world needs. Ask what makes you come alive, and go do it. Because what the world needs is more people who have come alive." The fifty days of Easter offer us an opportunity to reflect on our call to follow the Risen Lord. As a part of this, I invite you to join me in considering the people, places, work, and social causes that make us come alive in our discipleship. Let's continue to live in Easter H.O.P.E and adopt a Godly attitude - Holy Optimism Pervading Everything.

Scripture Message

For the evangelist Luke, Easter day is filled with action. The spice-bearing women go to the tomb and then announce the Resurrection to the Eleven, who consider it an "idle tale." Peter goes himself the tomb but comes away not sure what he has seen, more importantly, what all of it means. Two disciples head out of Jerusalem en route to Emmaus. It is a day of journeys. As the two disciples approach the village with the Stranger, the day is drawing to a close, but faith is about to dawn. Jesus acts as if He will travel on further. Then, as now, He will not impose Himself on the disciples, but rather waits to be invited to remain. When that invitation is forthcoming He readily accepts. Jesus enters the house as a quest, but quickly becomes the Host. He has already broken upon the Scriptures for them on the road, and then in the ritual action of the breaking of the bread, the revelation is complete. This Easter encounter is beloved story because it transitions from the lived encounters of the first disciples with the Risen Christ to our ongoing encounters with Christ in the Mass. Their hearts burn within them as He speaks to them about the Scriptures, a forerunner to the our Liturgy of the Word. Jesus is then recognized in the breaking of the bread, which is how he will remain with them - and with us - long after His ascension into heaven. The psalm's path imagery pairs perfectly with the Gospel, where the disciples encounter Jesus while walking. Journeys and pathways are common imagery for life with God: "Walking with God" is a favorite image in the Hebrew Scriptures for those who live faithfully. The psalm affirms the deep true ways that God remains with us, even if it is not always evident. The first reading shows Peter in his redemptive arc. From his cowardly denial of Jesus in the passion narrative to the moment when he stands up and proclaims the truth of Jesus' life, death, and resurrection. His encounter with the Risen Christ has transformed him with the courage that comes from God, a courage that can only manifest when "our faith and hope are in the Lord."



Carmel Mission Book Club


Book Club meets on Friday afternoons at 1:30 in Crespi Hall.

So, at this time of year, I have requested that our Parish Finance Council provide you with a report of where we stand. I thank our Council on your behalf.





low the first year, but soon of missions along the coast of Alta California. In 1771, Serra located Mission San Carlos de Borromeo de Carmelo at the

mouth of what is now Carmel Valley, a spot he described as "a locality indeed most delightful and suitable because of the extreme and excellent quality of the land and the water supply necessary for abundant harvests." Serra ultimately founded nine missions, but this remained his headquarters and favorite. He is buried here.



By 1835, Carmel, like the other missions, was secularized and its extensive land holdings divided among several large ranchos, pieces of which ultimately formed Carmel-by-the-Sea. The mission buildings slowly fell to ruin and weren't fully restored until Harry Downie began a meticulous restoration in 1931.

The Carmel Development Company sent out its first brochure in May of 1903 addressed "To the School teachers of California and other

in-door employment." It promoted on Carmel Beach in the pine forest Mission."

ofessors from Stanford and the University of California began to buy lots and build small cabins in the woods. The earthquake of 1906 brought refugees from San Francisco, many of thern artists and writers, drawn by the beauty and affordable prices.

Enticed by enthusiastic reports of Carmel's charms and affordable lifestyle, a number of these free spirits moved to the village where they became known as the "Bohemians." George and Carrie Sterling formed the center of a loosely structured group of friends that included among its members Mary Austin, Jack London, James Hopper, Herbert Heron and Sinclair Lewis. The Bohemians often gathered at the beach for abalone feasts, fine conversation and libations.

Vigilant stewardship has preserved the incomparable natural setting of coastline and beach. Trees are a vital element of the village landscape and citizens hold dear Carmel's history and sense of community. Residents treasure their village. They have resisted change and worked to protect the legacy left by earlier citizens.
