FR. PAUL'S MESSAGE

Dear Friend of Carmel Mission,

250[™] Anniversary CARMEL MISSION BASILICA

> In the Gospel today Jesus offers a very succinct explanation of the main requirements of discipleship: love God, love oneself, and love one's neighbors. Sounds easy, but as we all know, and as the state of our battered world can attest, it is easier said than done.

> On the one hand, loving God would seem to be the easiest of these commandments. God is perfect. God is not flawed or irritating. God is all loving, all merciful and completely in love with us. But God is also vast and mysterious, always present but often hard to see. Our faith can be an enormous part of how we engage in loving God. When we participate in our faith, we have opportunity to connect with God and express our love in tangible ways. In prayer, in the Eucharist, in the sacraments, we come face to face with our mysterious God's true and present love for us, making it easier for us to return God's love in equal measure.

One way we express our love for God is following His commandments, and Jesus makes clear in this Gospel that the next crucial commandment is to love our neighbor as ourselves. This is easy if we define our neighbors as people whom we already care for and for whom we are willing to extend ourselves. But we know that this is not Jesus' definition. He asks that disciples love neighbors who are difficult to love. People with whom we have little in common or with whom we disagree. While challenging, when we practice this love it we are loving more as God loves and our hearts are opened to healing and transformation.

All of God's commandments help us to either better love God, love ourselves, or love one another. Indeed, they can be a guidebook offering support and ideas to help us when we are struggling to do so. They can help us become, as St. Paul says in our second reading, "imitators of the Lord." (1 Thes 1:6)

I wish you and your loved one's blessings of good health, new hope, and the sure knowledge of God's great love. Please continue to pray for peace in our wounded world,

My dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

War, whether it be in Ukraine or in the Middle East is terrible. It is heart wrenching for the people living in these respective locations, but also for family and friends who care about those who live there.

Today, Tuesday, October 17, Cardinal Pierbattista Pizzaballa, Archbishop Latin Primate of Jerusalem, called for us to join him in praying for Peace and Reconciliation in the Holy Land. We spiritually accompany him in prayer, not only today, but also in the days ahead. The terrible massacre of Israeli children, women, and men (young and old) on Saturday, October 7th (*Our Lady of the Rosary*) was unthinkable and horrific. Now, hostages are being held. There is no excuse for this kind of violence and hate, regardless of what country or people. Every act of violence and hate begets more violence and hate!

How many times have I cried out upon hearing of such an atrocity, "*When will we learn, O Lord?*" Amidst, these difficult days, it is easy to become cynical and disengaged when this War seems to be so distant from us here in the United States. Regardless of national origin, these are our brothers and sisters!

Cardinal Pizzaballa has urged Catholics to organize times of praying with Eucharistic Adoration and recitation of the Rosary, "to deliver to God the Father our thirst for peace, justice and reconciliation." He also said, "In this time of sorrow and dismay, we do not want to remain helpless. We cannot let death and its sting (1 Cor 15-55) be the only word we hear." "That is why we feel the need to pray, to turn our hearts to God the Father. Only in his way we can draw the strength and serenity needed to endure these hard times, by turning to him, in prayer and intercession, to implore and cry out to God amidst this anguish."

As this war progresses, just as in Ukraine, let us be mindful of the humanitarian crisis that is growing exponentially every day. Innocent civilians, whether they be of Israeli or Palestinian descent are caught up in the middle of these acts of terror and destruction. There are NO winners!

Let us not forget to pray also for emergency and humanitarian workers: those who are assisting victims of this violence, who are in need of food, water, health care, and shelter. May our Lady of Peace intercede for all of us during this difficult time!

Scripture Reflection

Those antagonistic to Jesus – we encountered them last week too - do not give up. In the Gospel reading we hear today; the Sadducees have just been silenced by Jesus' interpretation of Scripture (Matt 22:23-33) but now the Pharisees return to confront Him. A lawyer, someone we would recognize today as a professional theologian, poses a question about the greatest commandment among the 613 precepts in the Mosaic Law. This is another bedeviling attempt to involve Jesus in a hairsplitting debate, not a typical discussion as was held in rabbinic circles for clarification. They again hope they have found a trick question. Naming one commandment as the greatest would devalue the others by comparison, making it sound as if Jesus does not value God's word in its fullness. Instead, Jesus shows He understands God's word far more deeply than those who are tied to reading the law literally. He names not one of the ten commandments, but one that comes after them in Deuteronomy. He reveals that fulfilling the law is not about servile deference to what is written, but about love. If our hearts are formed in love, the other commandments will follow, flowing forth from our inner being instead of forced as outer actions. The second commandment too can be named as secondary because it also flows from love of God. If we truly love God, so will we love our neighbor. The first reading shows that the God of the Old Testament is not some being foreign from the Jesus of the New Testament. The love that Jesus preaches does not replace the law. God's Old Testament commandments are more specific, and make the punishment clearer, but they are the very love of neighbor that Jesus named as so important. To treat foreigners and widows and orphans with justice is to fulfill the love to which we are called.

FIRST LIBRARY OF CALIFORNIA

As an update to the ongoing Convento Library cataloging project, I'd like to focus today on some of the people who used these books in their daily lives and as part of their missionary activity. It was not uncommon in the eighteenth century, as it is today, for people to write their names in books that they owned. I still do the same, as I suspect many of you do, too. Franciscan brothers would often write their names in certain books, sometimes along with other information, in what we call inscriptions. It's been especially interesting while examining the Convento books to look at these inscriptions, since they tell us about who used a particular book and when, and they give us clues as to when the book arrived at our library and from where.

Of course I would be thrilled to report that we have books "signed" by, or inscribed by Saint Junipero. We don't. That's probably not a coincidence. Junipero Serra was above all a very humble man, and as a devout Franciscan he did not believe in personal ownership. Father Serra would have viewed the books in the library as common property, which is to say property of the Order of Friars Minor.

We do have one enticing piece of evidence, though, that Saint Serra used a particular book, and that is very special indeed. This book was printed in 1761 and bears the title: "El Peregrino con Guia," or "The Pilgrim with a Guide." It is otherwise a fairly nondescript book with a vellum, or leather, wrapped binding. On the back of the leather cover is an ink inscription that reads: "para el padre Junipero," or "for Father Junipero." This is so far the only book I've discovered with Father Serra's name on it. The reason for this particular inscription on the binding is hard to ascertain. The book might have been a gift, or someone simply wanted to indicate that Padre Junipero wanted to see this particular book, or maybe had even asked for it. In any case, we can certainly imagine Saint Junipero in his room, late at night, reading this particular book by candlelight.



We do have the names of some other missionaries in books, some well known, others not. Another name we might all recognize is that of Father Francisco Palou, Junipero Serra's biographer, one-time student, and good friend. In a large book on St. Bernardine of Siena, we read the Latin inscription on the title page: "Utilitur [for use by] Fray Franciscus Palou," using a Latinized version of his first name. Whether or not this is by his own hand is hard to determine and will require more close comparison with known examples of his writing, but nonetheless it shows his interest in this one book.





FIRST LIBRARY OF CALIFORNIA

A few of our bookworms are less known to us. A number of books contain handwritten inscriptions by Padre Dionisio Basterra. He is especially prominent in the first bookcase, that is, he liked the large books. The interesting fact about Father Basterra is that he never came up to Alta California. Instead, we find him in Baja, California, where Father Serra met him on his way up to founding Mission San Diego. We don't know much else about Basterra, except that he was a young man and completely on his own at Mission Santa Gertrudis. He eventually returned to the College of San Fernando in Mexico City. How the books with his name in them came to be here in Carmel is a mystery.

Finally, I'll introduce one last book lover, Pedro Benito Cambon. We know more about Father Cambon because he worked for many years in Alta California alongside Father Serra. Cambon departed for New Spain in 1769. His initial destination was the newly established mission of San Diego, but he went on to land at Monterey on 21 May, 1771. Once he arrived here on our own shores, Father Serra directed him and Fray Angel Somera to found Mission San Gabriel. This they did on 8 September, 1771. Soon enough, Cambon returned to San Diego, but bigger things were still in store for him. In 1776, Pedro Cambon and Francisco Palou reached the site of what was to become Mission Dolores in San Francisco. After three years there as Palou's assistant, Cambon returned to Mexico due to ill health, but he

wasn't done yet. After recovering, he returned to San Gabriel, then went on to help found Mission San Buenaventura in 1782. His service in Alta California in fact continued until 1791. The next year he returned to his native Spain again in ill health, but his place and year of death are unknown.


This brief review of some of the readers and custodians of our Mission books will be followed in a few months time by another update, this time on the markings used by institutions and missions to claim ownership of their own books.

MISSION DOORS RESTORATION PROJECT

We have undertaken the much needed restoration of many of the beautiful wooden doors at Carmel Mission.



The doors of the Carmel Mission are based on designs seen throughout the California Mission Chain and designs replicated throughout the Southwest, Mexico, and Spain. We do have some information that is helpful..

For example the Mission's main entrance doors we are fairly certain are based on Sir Harry Downie's affinity of the doors at Mission Dolores.



MISSION DOORS RESTORATION PROJECT

The much heralded and aperciate "River of Life" door design has been given much attention as it is a prominent feature at many of our Historic Missions. From a traditional understandings that has grown over time the River of Life motif is a direct reference to Revelation 22:



1 And he showed me a river of water of life, bright as crystal, proceeding out of the throne of God and of the Lamb, 2 in the midst of the street thereof. And on this side of the river and on that was the tree of life, bearing twelve manner of fruits, yielding its fruit every month: and the leaves of the tree were for the healing of the nations.

From and other perspective the three wavy lines have been linked to the trinity. The design of three is a common motif in Church architecture.



As you will see in the before and after photographs, the restoration has brought new life to many of the doors.

This project has also given us an opportunity to observe the diversity of architectural styles and incredible workmanship that went into creating the doors.



In a recent conversation pertaining to the unique design with noted Spanish Colonial architecture expert Gloria Giffords shared that all of these perspectives are "dandy ideas". She shared we really don't know where these interpretations come from because we don't have any documentation from when this design was first introduced. In a world that offers so many answers and information it is good that our Mission Church still has a few more mysteries to share. It is even better that we continue to preserve and protect these unique architectural features for future generations to ponder and explore.



Carmel Mission's I-HELP ministry needs YOUR help!





St. Jude Thaddeus—Patron Saint of Lost Causes



Feast Day: October 28 - Patron of Desperate Cases

Saint Jude, known as Thaddeus, was the nephew of Mary and Joseph, and a cousin of our Lord. He was the brother of the apostle James the Less. As a young man, Saint Jude knew Jesus well, and left everything to follow Him. At Pentecost, Saint Jude, along with Mother Mary and the other disciples of Jesus, was filled with the Holy Spirit. Tongues like fire rested on their heads, as the Holy Spirit gave the disciples the grace and the fervent desire to reach out to the lost of the world with the message of God's love. That



is why Saint Jude is often pictured with a tongue of fire on his head. Saint Jude is pictured wearing an image of Jesus because through the power of Jesus' name he healed a king suffering from leprosy. Saint Jude also wrote a Letter, or Epistle, that we find in the New Testament. He encourages us to keep strong in our faith even when it is not easy. The two apostles, Saints Simon and Jude, labored as missionaries in the country of Armenia, where they suffered martyrdom. Saint Jude's relics today are honored in Saint Peter's basilica in Rome.




