FR. PAUL'S MESSAGE

Dear Friend of Carmel Mission,

We are all familiar with the saying, "practice what you preach." Our Gospel today shows us just how old this saying, and this sentiment, truly is. Jesus is frustrated with religious leaders who devote their lives to God's law but fail to live it out. They know the law – and that the law is important. But knowing the law intellectually is only the first step. Jesus calls His disciples to embody the law with their whole being – mind, body, and spirit. Jesus sees the scribes' and Pharisees' interpretation of God's law being used weigh people down – "They tie up heavy burdens hard to carry and lay them on people's shoulders" (Matt 23:4) - when instead God's law should be inspiring them to help lift people up.

Our Catholic faith has a strong tradition of servant leadership. One of the titles of our Holy Father, the supreme head of our Roman Catholic Church, is Servus Servorum Dei (Servant of the Servants of God). Jesus Himself gave us this example when He washed the feet of His disciples, and later submitted to the pain and humiliation of the cross for the salvation of humankind. In the closing of today's Gospel passage, Jesus reminds His disciples that humility needs to be a hallmark of our life of faith. Sometimes it seems there is little room for humility in our modern world. It can often feel like survival, let alone success, requires relentless ambition. But humility need not be at odds with ambition, or even authority. Jesus certainly had complete authority, and was not shy to use it to act for good. We too may have authority in our own spheres of influence, but can still practice humility in how we use our power in the world.

Another week has passed with our fractured world in the terrible grip of war. Please consider joining us on Fridays in November to pray for peace. Mass will be at 12pm in the Blessed Sacrament Chapel, followed by the exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, the recitation of the Rosary to Our Lady, Queen of Peace, and adoration will continue until 5pm. Even if you can only stop in a for a few moments, you will be demonstrating your commitment to peace and justice in solidarity with all around the world who pray, and work, for peace.

My dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

War, whether it be in Ukraine or in the Middle East is terrible. It is heart wrenching for the people living in these respective locations, but also for family and friends who care about those who live there.

Today, Tuesday, October 17, Cardinal Pierbattista Pizzaballa, Archbishop Latin Primate of Jerusalem, called for us to join him in praying for Peace and Reconciliation in the Holy Land. We spiritually accompany him in prayer, not only today, but also in the days ahead. The terrible massacre of Israeli children, women, and men (young and old) on Saturday, October 7th (*Our Lady of the Rosary*) was unthinkable and horrific. Now, hostages are being held. There is no excuse for this kind of violence and hate, regardless of what country or people. Every act of violence and hate begets more violence and hate!

How many times have I cried out upon hearing of such an atrocity, "When will we learn, O Lord?" Amidst, these difficult days, it is easy to become cynical and disengaged when this War seems to be so distant from us here in the United States. Regardless of national origin, these are our brothers and sisters!

Cardinal Pizzaballa has urged Catholics to organize times of praying with Eucharistic Adoration and recitation of the Rosary, "to deliver to God the Father our thirst for peace, justice and reconciliation." He also said, "In this time of sorrow and dismay, we do not want to remain helpless. We cannot let death and its sting (1 Cor 15-55) be the only word we hear." "That is why we feel the need to pray, to turn our hearts to God the Father. Only in his way we can draw the strength and serenity needed to endure these hard times, by turning to him, in prayer and intercession, to implore and cry out to God amidst this anguish."

As this war progresses, just as in Ukraine, let us be mindful of the humanitarian crisis that is growing exponentially every day. Innocent civilians, whether they be of Israeli or Palestinian descent are caught up in the middle of these acts of terror and destruction. There are NO winners!

Let us not forget to pray also for emergency and humanitarian workers: those who are assisting victims of this violence, who are in need of food, water, health care, and shelter. May our Lady of Peace intercede for all of us during this difficult time!

Scripture Reflection

In today's Gospel reading, Jesus uses denunciation as a method of illustrating the qualities of authentic leadership among His disciples His first criticism is of those who "preach but they do not practice." Some religious leaders, says Jesus, exercise control by teaching interpretations of the law that are excessively legalistic and burdensome. What Jesus offers is burden-lifting mercy and rest to those who come to Him (Matt 11:28). This Gospel also has one of Jesus' familiar reversals of our expectations for this world. In the case of these leaders, their misguided love for recognition and honor outweighs their love for God. They seem to hold power - and by earthly standards they do- but they are not enacting the true power that is available to all of us. This power is God's gift and enables us enact God's will. This often does not look a lot like power by the world's standards; rather it can look a lot like servanthood. Jesus invites His followers to humble themselves, because humility is the basis of true exultation in God's Kingdom. In this humility we can also find an elusive unity, joined as brothers and sisters under one loving Teacher, Father, and Master. Both the psalm and the second reading use images of being cared for as a mother cares for her children. In the psalm it is an image of God's care for us, in the letter to the Thessalonians it is an image of how church leaders ought to care for the flock entrusted to them. This is again a reversal of worldly expectations; the self-giving work of motherhood often goes unseen and unacknowledged, yet here is a mark of leadership.



FIRST LIBRARY OF CALIFORNIA

As an update to the ongoing Convento Library cataloging project, I'd like to focus today on some of the people who used these books in their daily lives and as part of their missionary activity. It was not uncommon in the eighteenth century, as it is today, for people to write their names in books that they owned. I still do the same, as I suspect many of you do, too. Franciscan brothers would often write their names in certain books, sometimes along with other information, in what we call inscriptions. It's been especially interesting while examining the Convento books to look at these inscriptions, since they tell us about who used a particular book and when, and they give us clues as to when the book arrived at our library and from where.

Of course I would be thrilled to report that we have books "signed" by, or inscribed by Saint Junipero. We don't. That's probably not a coincidence. Junipero Serra was above all a very humble man, and as a devout Franciscan he did not believe in personal ownership. Father Serra would have viewed the books in the library as common property, which is to say property of the Order of Friars Minor.

We do have one enticing piece of evidence, though, that Saint Serra used a particular book, and that is very special indeed. This book was printed in 1761 and bears the title: "El Peregrino con Guia," or "The Pilgrim with a Guide." It is otherwise a fairly nondescript book with a vellum, or leather, wrapped binding. On the back of the leather cover is an ink inscription that reads: "para el padre Junipero," or "for Father Junipero." This is so far the only book I've discovered with Father Serra's name on it. The reason for this particular inscription on the binding is hard to ascertain. The book might have been a gift, or someone simply wanted to indicate that Padre Junipero wanted to see this particular book, or maybe had even asked for it. In any case, we can certainly imagine Saint Junipero in his room, late at night, reading this particular book by candlelight.




We do have the names of some other missionaries in books, some well known, others not. Another name we might all recognize is that of Father Francisco Palou, Junipero Serra's biographer, one-time student, and good friend. In a large book on St. Bernardine of Siena, we read the Latin inscription on the title page: "Utilitur [for use by] Fray Franciscus Palou," using a Latinized version of his first name. Whether or not this is by his own hand is hard to determine and will require more close comparison with known examples of his writing, but nonetheless it shows his interest in this one book.

FIRST LIBRARY OF CALIFORNIA

A few of our bookworms are less known to us. A number of books contain handwritten inscriptions by Padre Dionisio Basterra. He is especially prominent in the first bookcase, that is, he liked the large books. The interesting fact about Father Basterra is that he never came up to Alta California. Instead, we find him in Baja, California, where Father Serra met him on his way up to founding Mission San Diego. We don't know much else about Basterra, except that he was a young man and completely on his own at Mission Santa Gertrudis. He eventually returned to the College of San Fernando in Mexico City. How the books with his name in them came to be here in Carmel is a mystery.




Finally, I'll introduce one last book lover, Pedro Benito Cambon. We know more about Father Cambon because he worked for many years in Alta California alongside Father Serra. Cambon departed for New Spain in 1769. His initial destination was the newly established mission of San Diego, but he went on to land at Monterey on 21 May, 1771. Once he arrived here on our own shores, Father Serra directed him and Fray Angel Somera to found Mission San Gabriel. This they did on 8 September, 1771. Soon enough, Cambon returned to San Diego, but bigger things were still in store for him. In 1776, Pedro Cambon and Francisco Palou reached the site of what was to become Mission Dolores in San Francisco. After three years there as Palou's assistant, Cambon returned to Mexico due to ill health, but he

wasn't done yet. After recovering, he returned to San Gabriel, then went on to help found Mission San Buenaventura in 1782. His service in Alta California in fact continued until 1791. The next year he returned to his native Spain again in ill health, but his place and year of death are unknown.

This brief review of some of the readers and custodians of our Mission books will be followed in a few months time by another update, this time on the markings used by institutions and missions to claim ownership of their own books.

Mission Doors Restoration Project

We have undertaken the much needed restoration of many of the beautiful wooden doors at Carmel Mission.



The doors of the Carmel Mission are based on designs seen throughout the California Mission Chain and designs replicated throughout the Southwest, Mexico, and Spain. We do have some information that is helpful..

For example the Mission's main entrance doors we are fairly certain are based on Sir Harry Downie's affinity of the doors at Mission Dolores.



Mission Doors Restoration Project

The much heralded and aperciate "River of Life" door design has been given much attention as it is a prominent feature at many of our Historic Missions. From a traditional understandings that has grown over time the River of Life motif is a direct reference to Revelation 22:





1 And he showed me a river of water of life, bright as crystal, proceeding out of the throne of God and of the Lamb, 2 in the midst of the street thereof. And on this side of the river and on that was the tree of life, bearing twelve manner of fruits, yielding its fruit every month: and the leaves of the tree were for the healing of the nations.

From and other perspective the three wavy lines have been linked to the trinity. The design of three is a common motif in Church architecture.











As you will see in the before and after photographs, the restoration has brought new life to many of the doors.



Mission Doors Restoration Project

This project has also given us an opportunity to observe the diversity of architectural styles and incredible workmanship that went into creating the doors.



In a recent conversation pertaining to the unique design with noted Spanish Colonial architecture expert Gloria Giffords shared that all of these perspectives are "dandy ideas". She shared we really don't know where these interpretations come from because we don't have any documentation from when this design was first introduced. In a world that offers so many answers and information it is good that our Mission Church still has a few more mysteries to share. It is even better that we continue to preserve and protect these unique architectural features for future generations to ponder and explore.

I-HELP Ministry Carmel Mission Basilica


Carmel Mission's I-HELP ministry needs YOUR help!



Feast Day: October 28 - Patron of Desperate Cases

Saint Jude, known as Thaddeus, was the nephew of Mary and Joseph, and a cousin of our Lord. He was the brother of the apostle James the Less. As a young man, Saint Jude knew Jesus well, and left everything to follow Him. At Pentecost, Saint Jude, along with Mother Mary and the other disciples of Jesus, was filled with the Holy Spirit. Tongues like fire rested on their heads, as the Holy Spirit gave the disciples the grace and the fervent desire to reach out to the lost of the world with the message of God's love. That


is why Saint Jude is often pictured with a tongue of fire on his head. Saint Jude is pictured wearing an image of Jesus because through the power of Jesus' name he healed a king suffering from leprosy. Saint Jude also wrote a Letter, or Epistle, that we find in the New Testament. He encourages us to keep strong in our faith even when it is not easy. The two apostles, Saints Simon and Jude, labored as missionaries in the country of Armenia, where they suffered martyrdom. Saint Jude's relics today are honored in Saint Peter's basilica in Rome.
