FR. PAUL'S MESSAGE

Dear Friend of Carmel Mission.

This year our Advent theme at Carmel Mission is "Preparing for Hope." This past Easter, I spoke about the power of HOPE – Holy Optimism Pervading Everything. I am sure we all have moments in our lives that attest to the power of hope and optimism. But as we look at our world today, it is too easy to become discouraged, disillusioned, cynical, and jaded.

At this moment, our world is in the grip of war. An unjust and inhumane war continues to rage in Ukraine. In the Holy Land, a land holy to three different faith traditions, war has erupted. Our world is in the grip of violence. Barely a week passes without the devastating news of another mass shooting, acts of senseless violence that rob innocent people of their lives and upend communities. Our world is in the grip of climate change, with an ever-increasing list of natural disasters which are also killing people and decimating communities. Our world is in the grip of division. In our nation, we are experiencing a time of unprecedented political and social division that is tugging at the fabric of our society.

When we look at the world, it is hard to not have a level of existential dread. But when God looks at the world, God looks with the eyes of HOPE. We too must learn to look at the world through the lens of hope. Despair only inspires paralysis and depression, but hope inspires action, creativity, and compassion. We cannot act for good in the world without hope.

We have the greatest cause for hope in this Advent season. Into our battered world, our broken lives, and our wounded hearts, the Prince of Peace is coming again. The joy and the mystery of the Incarnation show us that God never looks at the world with despair, only with HOPE. When we are near our loving God, we cannot help but be overwhelmed with God's hopeful vision. As we prepare for the birth of Jesus at Christmas, let us also prepare to welcome the HOPE that accompanies Him.

I wish you and your loved ones Advent blessings of good health and new hope. Please continue to pray for peace,

Scripture Reflection

"Be watchful! Be alert!" Don't be caught unaware! Jesus warns His disciples in this Sunday's Gospel reading. And so, begins another Advent season of watching and waiting. Advent is not just a time of waiting for the coming of the Christ Child - that already happened over two thousand years ago. It is a time when we break with routine and moved into heightened awareness of the ways of Emmanuel- "God with us." The watchfulness that Jesus talks about in the Gospel is not waiting in dread, nor is the object of our vigilance unknown. It is an attentive listening for the familiar footsteps of the returning of the Beloved. We do not want to be caught sleeping but waiting with open arms. Advent is a also a time for big, bold hope - the kind showcased in todays' first reading. The people return from exile to a city in ruins. Conquerors have destroyed their temple. Current residents shun them. They compare themselves to "polluted rags" and withering leaves Such hardships left the returned exiles at their wits' end - and they let God know it. They recognize God' anger and disappointment but never lose hope in the promise of God's redemption. With audacity they demand of God - "Oh that you would rend the heaves and come down, with the mountains quaking before you." They long to see God's awesome deeds. In the face of such destruction, the people never stop hoping that God will make something new. We too are called to big, bold hope. Like our ancestors in faith, God calls us to trust in God's saving power even - especiallyin our lowest moments. The psalm asks to see God's face, a dangerous thing in ancient Israel where it was believed that to see God's face would result in death. Even Moses is instructed to cover his face when he encounters God, and when God does grant a glimpse, it is of God's back. (Exodus 33:2023) After Christ, though, the meaning changes. In Jesus, God takes on a literal human face that people can encounter. That face is again hidden, but we find Jesus still in the Sacraments and in each other.

FIRST LIBRARY OF CALIFORNIA

As an update to the ongoing Convento Library cataloging project, I'd like to focus today on some of the people who used these books in their daily lives and as part of their missionary activity. It was not uncommon in the eighteenth century, as it is today, for people to write their names in books that they owned. I still do the same, as I suspect many of you do, too. Franciscan brothers would often write their names in certain books, sometimes along with other information, in what we call inscriptions. It's been especially interesting while examining the Convento books to look at these inscriptions, since they tell us about who used a particular book and when, and they give us clues as to when the book arrived at our library and from where.

Of course I would be thrilled to report that we have books "signed" by, or inscribed by Saint Junipero. We don't. That's probably not a coincidence. Junipero Serra was above all a very humble man, and as a devout Franciscan he did not believe in personal ownership. Father Serra would have viewed the books in the library as common property, which is to say property of the Order of Friars Minor.

We do have one enticing piece of evidence, though, that Saint Serra used a particular book, and that is very special indeed. This book was printed in 1761 and bears the title: "El Peregrino con Guia," or "The Pilgrim with a Guide." It is otherwise a fairly nondescript book with a vellum, or leather, wrapped binding. On the back of the leather cover is an ink inscription that reads: "para el padre Junipero," or "for Father Junipero." This is so far the only book I've discovered with Father Serra's name on it. The reason for this particular inscription on the binding is hard to ascertain. The book might have been a gift, or someone simply wanted to indicate that Padre Junipero wanted to see this particular book, or maybe had even asked for it. In any case, we can certainly imagine Saint Junipero in his room, late at night, reading this particular book by candlelight.




We do have the names of some other missionaries in books, some well known, others not. Another name we might all recognize is that of Father Francisco Palou, Junipero Serra's biographer, one-time student, and good friend. In a large book on St. Bernardine of Siena, we read the Latin inscription on the title page: "Utilitur [for use by] Fray Franciscus Palou," using a Latinized version of his first name. Whether or not this is by his own hand is hard to determine and will require more close comparison with known examples of his writing, but nonetheless it shows his interest in this one book.

FIRST LIBRARY OF CALIFORNIA

A few of our bookworms are less known to us. A number of books contain handwritten inscriptions by Padre Dionisio Basterra. He is especially prominent in the first bookcase, that is, he liked the large books. The interesting fact about Father Basterra is that he never came up to Alta California. Instead, we find him in Baja, California, where Father Serra met him on his way up to founding Mission San Diego. We don't know much else about Basterra, except that he was a young man and completely on his own at Mission Santa Gertrudis. He eventually returned to the College of San Fernando in Mexico City. How the books with his name in them came to be here in Carmel is a mystery.




Finally, I'll introduce one last book lover, Pedro Benito Cambon. We know more about Father Cambon because he worked for many years in Alta California alongside Father Serra. Cambon departed for New Spain in 1769. His initial destination was the newly established mission of San Diego, but he went on to land at Monterey on 21 May, 1771. Once he arrived here on our own shores, Father Serra directed him and Fray Angel Somera to found Mission San Gabriel. This they did on 8 September, 1771. Soon enough, Cambon returned to San Diego, but bigger things were still in store for him. In 1776, Pedro Cambon and Francisco Palou reached the site of what was to become Mission Dolores in San Francisco. After three years there as Palou's assistant, Cambon returned to Mexico due to ill health, but he

wasn't done yet. After recovering, he returned to San Gabriel, then went on to help found Mission San Buenaventura in 1782. His service in Alta California in fact continued until 1791. The next year he returned to his native Spain again in ill health, but his place and year of death are unknown.

This brief review of some of the readers and custodians of our Mission books will be followed in a few months time by another update, this time on the markings used by institutions and missions to claim ownership of their own books.

Mission Doors Restoration Project

We have undertaken the much needed restoration of many of the beautiful wooden doors at Carmel Mission.



The doors of the Carmel Mission are based on designs seen throughout the California Mission Chain and designs replicated throughout the Southwest, Mexico, and Spain. We do have some information that is helpful..

For example the Mission's main entrance doors we are fairly certain are based on Sir Harry Downie's affinity of the doors at Mission Dolores.



MISSION DOORS RESTORATION PROJECT

The much heralded and aperciate "River of Life" door design has been given much attention as it is a prominent feature at many of our Historic Missions. From a traditional understandings that has grown over time the River of Life motif is a direct reference to Revelation 22:





1 And he showed me a river of water of life, bright as crystal, proceeding out of the throne of God and of the Lamb, 2 in the midst of the street thereof. And on this side of the river and on that was the tree of life, bearing twelve manner of fruits, yielding its fruit every month: and the leaves of the tree were for the healing of the nations.

From and other perspective the three wavy lines have been linked to the trinity. The design of three is a common motif in Church architecture.











As you will see in the before and after photographs, the restoration has brought new life to many of the doors.



Mission Doors Restoration Project

This project has also given us an opportunity to observe the diversity of architectural styles and incredible workmanship that went into creating the doors.



In a recent conversation pertaining to the unique design with noted Spanish Colonial architecture expert Gloria Giffords shared that all of these perspectives are "dandy ideas". She shared we really don't know where these interpretations come from because we don't have any documentation from when this design was first introduced. In a world that offers so many answers and information it is good that our Mission Church still has a few more mysteries to share. It is even better that we continue to preserve and protect these unique architectural features for future generations to ponder and explore.



I-HELP Ministry Carmel Mission Basilica


Carmel Mission's I-HELP ministry needs YOUR help!


All weekly and monthly events are posted in that group. We are entirely volunteer run and look forward to supporting the needs for young adults in the age group of 21-35!


