



Easter Sunday of the Resurrection of the Lord March 31, 2024



### Dear Friend of Carmel Mission,

Last year on Easter Sunday I spoke about HOPE, Holy Optimism Pervading Everything. This is a way of looking at the world through God's eyes - seeing the promise, the beauty, and the innate dignity in each individual. When we look at ourselves, each other, and the world as God does, we can develop a more hopeful outlook which can prompt action to make the world align with God's vision for it, and for us. This year, I suggest that we explore another of God's lens, Love. Our Holy Father, Pope Francis, wrote recently, "The Cross is the word through which God has responded to evil in the world. Sometimes it may seem as though God does not react to evil, as if He is silent. And yet, God has spoken, and His answer is the Cross of Christ: a word which is love, mercy and forgiveness. It also reveals a judgement, namely, that God, in judging us, loves us."

God does not look away from evil in the world, but neither does God look with the condemnation, cynicism, and despair to which we humans are prone. Throughout salvation history, God has believed that humanity can do better, and has worked to encourage and lift us up. It was with such hope, and such all-consuming love, that God sent us His Son. Jesus looked evil, hatred, and injustice in the face in His Passion, and yet His words on the cross were still, "Father, forgive them." Jesus did not ignore the wrong that was done to Him, but He overwhelmed it with His love.

Today we celebrate Christ's victory over death in our imperfect world. We are filled with Easter joy, but sobered by the realization that for some, that joy feels out of reach. When we imagine that the Cross is not an instrument of suffering but an expression of love, mercy and forgiveness, we see our world as God does, full of promise and hope. This is the Easter message we are meant to share with our brothers and sisters. Our hope is never in vain, for love truly does conquer all.

I wish you and your loved ones Easter blessings of good health, new hope, and great joy. May the Risen Lord bring peace to our world, and to our hearts,

## **Scripture Reflection**

In the Gospel for the Vigil, three women go to anoint the body of Jesus, in line with the Jewish custom. They are participating in a tradition they have likely done before. It is worth noting that these are not direct family members of Jesus, but friends, and relatives of friends. The community that Jesus created in life is not one bound by bloodlines, but one that is expanded to include these women and other friends. The first sentence of this Gospel tells us that the people with immediate concern and responsibility for Jesus' body are what we might call "chosen family." They are surrogate sisters and mothers showing up to do a caretaking role that they are not obligated, but still feel a duty, to perform. This tells us a great deal about the relationships Jesus cultivated, especially with women, during His ministry. The big twist here is, of course, the body is not there. The first thought is not resurrection but grave robbing, but then a man in white is there telling them that everything is fine. We can only imagine their amazement, confusion, and the first glimmers of their hope through faith. In the Gospel for the Easter day another group of Jesus' chosen family are asking, were is the body? Mary Magdalene, Peter and the Beloved Disciple all bear witness that Jesus is not in His tomb, but "they did not yet understand the Scripture that he had to rise from the dead." Even on Easter Sunday, the disciples do not quite get it. Jesus' resurrection is still hidden in mystery. There are hints here- empty tomb and burial clothes. But they misread the clues. The fullness of what has happened has yet to be revealed. This is not unlike how we experience the mystery of Easter. We live in the light of the resurrection and yet still experience pain, suffering, and loss. Easter joy may not always be accessible in its fullness, but we know there is more than we can see. Today is a day for rejoicing in all the joy we feel, and all the joy we anticipate as well. Alleluia!



# HUU VAN NGUYEN CUSTODIAN EXTRAORDINAIRE



The Carmel Mission is filled with a priceless collection of artwork, statues, and artifacts. One of the most precious treasures is our beloved Huu Van Nguyen who has faithfully given of himself, his time, and his talents to care for our Mission, its pastors, staff, parishioners, and visitors for 45 years. There are hundreds of projects that attest to the quality of Huu's workmanship. In honor of this milestone, I wanted to share with you a little more about Huu, his life, and his extraordinary work at the Mission.

Huu left Vietnam in 1977 as a refugee and initially settled in Connecticut. Two years later, on March 19th, 1979, Huu began working at Carmel Mission for Sir Harry Downie, the man entrusted with restoring the historic Mission.

Huu is a dedicated and devoted Catholic, husband, father, and friend. He is a master artisan and a talented carpenter, but his skills do not end there. He has worked expertly with metal, glass, ceramics, and fabrics. Huu impresses everyone he meets with his humility and gentle nature. Those fortunate enough to work with Huu, are impressed and inspired by the creativity he brings to all his work, large and small.

Huu has played an integral role in maintaining the Mission's art and artifacts through his expert restoration and preservation skills developed over his many years of service.

Huu worked with Sir Harry Downie for almost a year. Harry taught Huu many artistic processes, such as gold leafing and marbleizing, and impressed upon Huu the importance of properly maintaining the Mission's artifacts and buildings.

Huu also collaborated very closely with Sir Richard Menn at Carmel Mission and several other missions: Mission San Antonio de Padua, Mission San Juan Bautista, Mission Nuestra Señora de la Soledad, Mission San Fernando Rey de España, and Mission San Jose.



In 1987, during the visit of the Holy Father to the Monterey Peninsula, Huu helped to build the altar at Laguna Seca where Pope John Paul II celebrated Mass for more than seventy thousand people.

Huu's workmanship is truly enhanced by his love and appreciation for everything in the Mission, and its historical and spiritual significance. We believe that all beauty is a reflection of God's beauty, and thanks to the skill and devotion of Huu, the Mission stands as such a reflection of our parish family and the thousands of pilgrims we welcome each year.

Huu has gilded the reredos, the casement for St. Junipero's original coffin, the Christ the King altar, Our Lady of Bethlehem altar, and the Blessed Sacrament Chapel. On the Basilica's altar he has beautifully restored most of the original gilding.







He painted the six handmade wooden chandeliers that were installed in the Basilica during its 2012-2013 renovation.

Huu constructed and painted the beautiful ambo and the Presider's chair in the sanctuary.

Huu also did the faux marble appearance and the hand-carved decorations surrounding the organ pipes.


## A Place of Prayer and Peace

## I-HELP Ministry Carmel Mission Basilica


### Carmel Mission's I-HELP ministry needs YOUR help!


