



#### Dear Friend of Carmel Mission,

In the Gospel today Jesus appears to His (male) disciples for the first time since His crucifixion. We can only imagine the combination of grief and terror that kept them behind locked doors. They had watched their leader and friend summarily and cruelly executed by the civil authorities at the behest of the religious authorities. They must have imagined that they would be next if they were to even poke their heads out of hiding. Suddenly a fully alive Jesus is in their midst, bearing the scars of His ordeal, and He extends peace -not recrimination for their abandonment or their failure to comprehend all that had to happen to Him to fulfill His destiny. Jesus gives them what He knows they most need, peace.

In his Easter Urbi et Orbi message, our Holy Father, Pope Francis, addresses in detail the current desperate need for peace in the world. "War is always an absurdity; war is always a defeat! Let us not allow the strengthening winds of war to blow on Europe and the Mediterranean. Let us not yield to the logic of weapons and rearming. Peace is never made with arms, but with outstretched hands and open hearts." He lists the world's conflicts that are weighing on his heart, in Gaza, Ukraine, Syria, Lebanon, the West Balkans, Haiti, Armenia, Azerbaijan, Myanmar, the African continent, as well as the issues facing migrants worldwide, the scourge of human trafficking and dangers of climate change. I would add, in our own nation, the current climate of political and social division, and the horror of gun violence in our communities. While the list feels perhaps too long to remedy, our Holy Father also offers the solution, "Brothers and sisters, Jesus Christ is risen! Jesus alone opens up before us the doors of life, those doors that continually we shut with the wars spreading throughout the world."

The path to peace is paved with the forgiveness and reconciliation that Jesus models in today's Gospel. Please join me this week in urgent and sincere prayer that Christ's peace may come to our world, our nation, our homes and our hearts. May we be the outstretched hands and open hearts that allow the risen Lord to open the doors of life and peace.

## **Scripture Reflection**

At a gathering, there is always someone who is willing to speak up when everyone else may be wondering the same thing but are afraid to ask. In today's Gospel is it is Thomas who voices the doubts and fears with which others are also struggling. In his Gospel, John frequently uses one character as a representative figure. In today's Gospel. Thomas stands for everyone who is a following of Jesus, but harbors doubts. In the first scene the disciples are together, locked in their fear, when Jesus comes into their midst. His double declaration, "Peace be with you," recalls His promise of peace that casts out fear. (John 14:27). Jesus then shows the disciples the scars on His hands, feet and side, the inerasable evidence of what He endured. He then sends the disciples to continue the mission on which His Father sent Him. In Johns' Gospel there is no calling or sending of the Twelve, the mission is entrusted to all disciples here, empowered by the Holy Spirit. The power that the disciples receive with this infusion of the Holy Spirit is the ability to heal and forgive. In the second scene, Thomas stands in for all who were not present at the initial experience with the Risen Christ. Just as Mary Magdalene did, so the disciples declare, "we have seen the Lord" (John 20:17, 25) But belief on the basis of another's word is not sufficient; one must have fisrst hand experience of Christ in order to participate in His mission. Jesus once again stands in the midst, bringing peace. He directs Thomas to probe the meaning of His wounds so that he too can become an agent of forgiveness and healing. When Thomas makes His acclamation of faith, Jesus affirms there are two ways of blessedness; believing by having seen, and believing without having seen. The crucial thing is to believe, so as to have life.



# HUU VAN NGUYEN CUSTODIAN EXTRAORDINAIRE



The Carmel Mission is filled with a priceless collection of artwork, statues, and artifacts. One of the most precious treasures is our beloved Huu Van Nguyen who has faithfully given of himself, his time, and his talents to care for our Mission, its pastors, staff, parishioners, and visitors for 45 years. There are hundreds of projects that attest to the quality of Huu's workmanship. In honor of this milestone, I wanted to share with you a little more about Huu, his life, and his extraordinary work at the Mission.

Huu left Vietnam in 1977 as a refugee and initially settled in Connecticut. Two years later, on March 19th, 1979, Huu began working at Carmel Mission for Sir Harry Downie, the man entrusted with restoring the historic Mission.

Huu is a dedicated and devoted Catholic, husband, father, and friend. He is a master artisan and a talented carpenter, but his skills do not end there. He has worked expertly with metal, glass, ceramics, and fabrics. Huu impresses everyone he meets with his humility and gentle nature. Those fortunate enough to work with Huu, are impressed and inspired by the creativity he brings to all his work, large and small.

Huu has played an integral role in maintaining the Mission's art and artifacts through his expert restoration and preservation skills developed over his many years of service.

Huu worked with Sir Harry Downie for almost a year. Harry taught Huu many artistic processes, such as gold leafing and marbleizing, and impressed upon Huu the importance of properly maintaining the Mission's artifacts and buildings.

Huu also collaborated very closely with Sir Richard Menn at Carmel Mission and several other missions: Mission San Antonio de Padua, Mission San Juan Bautista, Mission Nuestra Señora de la Soledad, Mission San Fernando Rey de España, and Mission San Jose.



In 1987, during the visit of the Holy Father to the Monterey Peninsula, Huu helped to build the altar at Laguna Seca where Pope John Paul II celebrated Mass for more than seventy thousand people.

Huu's workmanship is truly enhanced by his love and appreciation for everything in the Mission, and its historical and spiritual significance. We believe that all beauty is a reflection of God's beauty, and thanks to the skill and devotion of Huu, the Mission stands as such a reflection of our parish family and the thousands of pilgrims we welcome each year.

Huu has gilded the reredos, the casement for St. Junipero's original coffin, the Christ the King altar, Our Lady of Bethlehem altar, and the Blessed Sacrament Chapel. On the Basilica's altar he has beautifully restored most of the original gilding.







He painted the six handmade wooden chandeliers that were installed in the Basilica during its 2012-2013 renovation.

Huu constructed and painted the beautiful ambo and the Presider's chair in the sanctuary.

Huu also did the faux marble appearance and the hand-carved decorations surrounding the organ pipes.


## A Place of Prayer and Peace



## I-HELP Ministry Carmel Mission Basilica


#### Carmel Mission's I-HELP ministry needs YOUR help!
