Dear Friend of Carmel Mission,

When Jesus appears to His disciples in today's Gospel, they are initially terrified. Considering that they did not understand what had to happen to Jesus a ghostly apparition was a more logical conclusion than Resurrection. Jesus offers reassurance, going so far as to eat in front of them to demonstrate that He is flesh and blood. His scarred body is a testimony to what He endured, and that He is in fact the same Jesus they knew and loved. Barely recovered from shock and overcome with joy, the disciples are then told that they are to preach in Jesus' name to all the nations, beginning in Jerusalem.

Opening minds and hearts to the Scriptures was a core part of Jesus' ministry. The Hebrew Scriptures – specifically the law of Moses, the writings of the prophets, and the psalms – shaped Jesus during His life. The Christian Scriptures that would come later continue the wisdom put forth in these ancient texts. It was important to Jesus that His disciples understand the significance of His fulfillment of the Scriptures. We know that the Word is one of the ways that God is alive and present in the world today and the Son of God continues to open minds and hearts to the revelations contained therein. Spending time with the Scriptures, whether in structured settings like Bible Study or the practice of Lectio Divina or simply by reading and praying with the Scriptures in our own time and in our own way, is an important, and sometimes overlooked, way to be in relationship with God.

We do not have the privilege of experiencing the Risen Christ in the same manner as the first disciples, but we do certainly encounter Him. In the Sacraments, in Scripture, and in our human relationships, He Is present to us. He often comes to us in unexpected ways, and asks us to do difficult things, but as with the disciples, He always offers the same invitation to come closer, to see more fully who He and what He is doing. May we indeed take that step closer to see Him well enough so that we too may respond with amazement and joy.

I wish you and your loved ones Easter blessings of good health and new hope. Please continue to pray for peace,

Scripture Reflection

Today's Gospel has many resonances with last weeks. In both the Risen Christ appears to the disciples and "stands in their midst." In both, His first words are "Peace be with you," and then He shows them His hands and His feet. In both accounts the disciples move from terror to joy. Both stories end with a sending of the disciples in mission. Despite the similarities, there are quite different in their theological emphasis. Luke's focus is on the identity of the Risen Christ, His reality and tangibility. Unlike the story of Thomas in John's Gospel which focuses on believing, in Luke's' Gospel the reason the disciples see and touch Jesus' wounded hands and feet is to convince them that the Risen One is the same Jesus who was crucified, and who still bears the marks of His ordeal on His body. Jesus is not just a memory or a haunting ghost. He is truly alive and tangible. Unlike the preceding Emmaus scene, where Jesus eating with the two disciples is revelatory and eucharistic, in today's Gospel Jesus' eating serves as proof He is alive in bodily form In the second half of Luke's Gospel, the focus shifts to the mission of the disciples to be witnesses to the suffering Messiah who is raised. Key to being a witness is understanding the scriptures, as well as repentance and forgiveness of sins. In the first reading we see Peter getting to work, being the witness Jesus asks him to be. He shares what he has seen, reminding his listeners both of their quilt in the crucifixion and the hope that still awaits them. He preaches the repentance to which Jesus calls us all. In the psalm we ask God to reveal God's self to us as Jesus reveals Himself to the disciples in the Gospel. It is not always easy to encounter Christ, but to see God's face is see light, and God "does wonders for His faithful one," never leaving us alone with the harder tasks of Christian life.



My Jesus,

I believe that You are present in the Most Holy Sacrament.

I love You above all things, and I desire to receive You into my soul.

Since I cannot at this moment receive You sacramentally,

come at least spiritually into my heart.

I embrace You as if You were already there and unite myself wholly to You.

Never permit me to be separated from You.



HUU VAN NGUYEN Custodian Extraordinaire



The Carmel Mission is filled with a priceless collection of artwork, statues, and artifacts. One of the most precious treasures is our beloved Huu Van Nguyen who has faithfully given of himself, his time, and his talents to care for our Mission, its pastors, staff, parishioners, and visitors for 45 years. There are hundreds of projects that attest to the quality of Huu's workmanship. In honor of this milestone, I wanted to share with you a little more about Huu, his life, and his extraordinary work at the Mission.

Huu left Vietnam in 1977 as a refugee and initially settled in Connecticut. Two years later, on March 19th, 1979, Huu began working at Carmel Mission for Sir Harry Downie, the man entrusted with restoring the historic Mission.

Huu is a dedicated and devoted Catholic, husband, father, and friend. He is a master artisan and a talented carpenter, but his skills do not end there. He has worked expertly with metal, glass, ceramics, and fabrics. Huu impresses everyone he meets with his humility and gentle nature. Those fortunate enough to work with Huu, are impressed and inspired by the creativity he brings to all his work, large and small.

Huu has played an integral role in maintaining the Mission's art and artifacts through his expert restoration and preservation skills developed over his many years of service.

Huu worked with Sir Harry Downie for almost a year. Harry taught Huu many artistic processes, such as gold leafing and marbleizing, and impressed upon Huu the importance of properly maintaining the Mission's artifacts and buildings.

Huu also collaborated very closely with Sir Richard Menn at Carmel Mission and several other missions: Mission San Antonio de Padua, Mission San Juan Bautista, Mission Nuestra Señora de la Soledad, Mission San Fernando Rey de España, and Mission San Jose.



In 1987, during the visit of the Holy Father to the Monterey Peninsula, Huu helped to build the altar at Laguna Seca where Pope John Paul II celebrated Mass for more than seventy thousand people.

Huu's workmanship is truly enhanced by his love and appreciation for everything in the Mission, and its historical and spiritual significance. We believe that all beauty is a reflection of God's beauty, and thanks to the skill and devotion of Huu, the Mission stands as such a reflection of our parish family and the thousands of pilgrims we welcome each year.


Huu has gilded the reredos, the casement for St. Junipero's original coffin, the Christ the King altar, Our Lady of Bethlehem altar, and the Blessed Sacrament Chapel. On the Basilica's altar he has beautifully restored most of the original gilding.



He painted the six handmade wooden chandeliers that were installed in the Basilica during its 2012-2013 renovation.

Huu constructed and painted the beautiful ambo and the Presider's chair in the sanctuary.

Huu also did the faux marble appearance and the hand-carved decorations surrounding the organ pipes.


A Place of Prayer and Peace

I-HELP Ministry Carmel Mission Basilica


Carmel Mission's I-HELP ministry needs YOUR help!


