Dear Friend of Carmel Mission,

In the Gospel today Jesus describes Himself as the Good Shepherd who knows and cares for the sheep as no one else can or will. The metaphor would have been very evocative for people in Jesus' time, many of whom were themselves shepherds and virtually all of whom would had some understanding of what that work entailed. It is also a metaphor that has stood the test of time, as it remains one of the most beloved ways we collectively envision our Savior. The image of a shepherd is used a number of times in Scripture to characterize a leader of the people. God is depicted as the Shepherd of Israel (Gen 49:24, Ps 23:1 78:52-53). Moses and David were actual shepherds before each was called to lead the people of Israel. When Israel's leaders were not tending to the needs of the people they were denounced as being abse

Jesus is very clear in the Gospel that it is His choice to lay down His life. He is not a victim of anyone or anything. Loved and empowered by the Father, He makes the choice to sacrifice Himself for His flock. We emulate this kind of shepherding not by actively seeking suffering but by putting love at the center: God's love made visible in Jesus, Jesus' love made manifest in us. It is a love that is freely chosen by an empowered self, with a willingness to do whatever is required and necessary. We do not follow our Shepherd blindly, but seek an ever more intimate knowledge of Him. Like Him, we are free to choose to continue His work of gathering all the disparate into one.

This work seems especially crucial in the present moment, when our world, our nation, and our communities feel increasingly fractured and divisive. Please join me this week in praying that, following the example of the Good Shepherd, we can strive to bring peace and unity where it is most needed.

Scripture Reflection

In the Gospel today Jesus calls Himself the Good Shepherd, and His descriptions of this role make it clear that having a shepherd like Jesus is not like being a sheep being raised for meat or wool. No matter how tenderly shepherds care for their flock it is an inherently utilitarian relationship. But having a good shepherd like ours means being known and loved. We are so loved that there is One wiling to lay down His very life for us. Having a good shepherd also means knowing the shepherd in turn. We may not always feel like we know Jesus, who often moves in subtle and mysterious ways. But we are promised that we have a home in Him and whenever our hearts stir with the recognition that we are known and loved, we can be assured that Jesus is there. There is a kind of domino effect in John's Gospel. First God pours out the divine self in love through the gift of the Word made flesh (1:14,3:16), a self-surrender that is replicated in Jesus' gift of self for those who are His own (10:15). This same action is what is asked of His followers, especially in leadership (15:13) In the second reading, John writes of the same love that joins us to our good shepherd, but he takes it even further. We are not just sheep in the flock, but in Christ have become adopted as children of God. God looks at us as beloved sons and daughters, brothers and sisters and co-heirs with Christ. We continue to grow into the love God offers and are to become something beyond our wildest imaginings. This is the third time we will sing psalm 118 in the four Sundays of the Easter season so far. We are encouraged to revisit and refresh our Easter joy, standing again with Mary Magdalene and the other disciples at the empty tomb.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

I am writing to you today on an important topic: the sexual abuse of minors. In 2019, the California legislature reopened the statute of limitations for childhood sexual abuse for a three-year period. The three-year period began on January 1, 2020 and ran through December 31, 2022. In that period of time, the Diocese of Monterey received approximately 100 lawsuits alleging childhood sexual abuse which occurred between the 1950s and 2002. As mentioned below, we have made significant changes to ensure the safety of children while under our care.

As you may have heard in the media, other California dioceses have either filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy protection or are considering it. In the Diocese of Monterey, we have been discussing how best to resolve these cases and how to be fair to all of the victims. One of the options that we have been considering is filing a Chapter 11 bankruptcy petition. This would allow all victims to be compensated from the limited funds that the Diocese has and will be allocated in an equitable manner.

I have consulted with the priests of the diocese, the Presbyteral Council, and my advisors and we are strongly considering this option. Our attorneys have tried other methods of resolution, but, unfortunately, have not been successful in reaching a resolution. While we have not made any final decision on filing for bankruptcy, it is highly likely in light of the number of lawsuits we are facing.

The issue of the sexual abuse of minors has been one that deeply saddens and disturbs all of us. It is an on-going human problem that has touched many families and all kinds of public and private organizations including, most sadly, the Catholic Church. These actions are never acceptable. Because of this, our prayers always support the victim-survivors, and we are committed to helping those touched by childhood sexual abuse by those working for the Church in Monterey.

Sexual abuse of children is intolerable, and we have worked hard in the Diocese of Monterey to restore trust in our processes and procedures so that children are safe. In 2002, the Bishops of the United States promulgated the *Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People*, we are committed to a zero-tolerance policy and on-going, required Safe Environment training for all, clergy, and laity, who participate in ministry. These decisive steps have made a positive difference. Above all, the Church firmly believes we must hold accountable those who perpetrate such violations.

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Again, I ask for your prayers for all victim-survivors. I also ask your prayers for our Diocese, parish communities, and all those who faithfully, with integrity and generosity, assist me in ministering to the People of God.



HUU VAN NGUYEN CUSTODIAN EXTRAORDINAIRE



The Carmel Mission is filled with a priceless collection of artwork, statues, and artifacts. One of the most precious treasures is our beloved Huu Van Nguyen who has faithfully given of himself, his time, and his talents to care for our Mission, its pastors, staff, parishioners, and visitors for 45 years. There are hundreds of projects that attest to the quality of Huu's workmanship. In honor of this milestone, I wanted to share with you a little more about Huu, his life, and his extraordinary work at the Mission.

Huu left Vietnam in 1977 as a refugee and initially settled in Connecticut. Two years later, on March 19th, 1979, Huu began working at Carmel Mission for Sir Harry Downie, the man entrusted with restoring the historic Mission.

Huu is a dedicated and devoted Catholic, husband, father, and friend. He is a master artisan and a talented carpenter, but his skills do not end there. He has worked expertly with metal, glass, ceramics, and fabrics. Huu impresses everyone he meets with his humility and gentle nature. Those fortunate enough to work with Huu, are impressed and inspired by the creativity he brings to all his work, large and small.

Huu has played an integral role in maintaining the Mission's art and artifacts through his expert restoration and preservation skills developed over his many years of service.

Huu worked with Sir Harry Downie for almost a year. Harry taught Huu many artistic processes, such as gold leafing and marbleizing, and impressed upon Huu the importance of properly maintaining the Mission's artifacts and buildings.

Huu also collaborated very closely with Sir Richard Menn at Carmel Mission and several other missions: Mission San Antonio de Padua, Mission San Juan Bautista, Mission Nuestra Señora de la Soledad, Mission San Fernando Rey de España, and Mission San Jose.



In 1987, during the visit of the Holy Father to the Monterey Peninsula, Huu helped to build the altar at Laguna Seca where Pope John Paul II celebrated Mass for more than seventy thousand people.

Huu's workmanship is truly enhanced by his love and appreciation for everything in the Mission, and its historical and spiritual significance. We believe that all beauty is a reflection of God's beauty, and thanks to the skill and devotion of Huu, the Mission stands as such a reflection of our parish family and the thousands of pilgrims we welcome each year.




He painted the six handmade wooden chandeliers that were installed in the Basilica during its 2012-2013 renovation.




This Sunday, we are launching the 2024 AMA Campaign: Blessed Sacrament Chapel - A place of Prayer and Peace.

I-HELP Ministry Carmel Mission Basilica


Carmel Mission's I-HELP ministry needs YOUR help!


